As we move through the summer, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on several important initiatives that your City Council and staff have been working on. While many of these projects take months, or even years, to complete, each represents an investment in the future of Cottonwood Heights.

One of our most significant ongoing efforts is updating the City's General Plan. This document serves as the long-term vision for how our

community will grow, preserve neighborhood character, improve transportation, support businesses, and maintain the quality of life that residents value. Public participation is a key part of this process, and I encourage you to take advantage of the opportunities to share your thoughts as we shape the next chapter of Cottonwood Heights.

The City also continues to place a strong emphasis on economic development. Attracting high-quality businesses, supporting redevelopment opportunities, and strengthening our commercial tax base remain important priorities. A stronger local economy helps diversify City revenues and positions us to maintain the services residents expect while reducing long-term reliance on property taxes.

Financial sustainability has also been a major focus in recent Council discussions. The proposed

Truth in Taxation process on August 11, 2026, at 6:00 PM, is intended to address longstanding structural budget challenges while providing the resources needed to maintain essential services, invest in City infrastructure, and plan responsibly for the future. Public participation is encouraged, and I invite residents to learn more by visiting our website and sharing their perspectives during the upcoming public hearing.

In addition, the City continues to invest in public safety, transportation, parks, and infrastructure improvements. From roadway maintenance and facility upgrades to long-range planning for community assets, our goal is to ensure that Cottonwood Heights remains a safe, attractive, and well-maintained place to live. Staff also continue working closely with our public safety partners to prepare for seasonal challenges, including wildfire prevention and emergency preparedness.

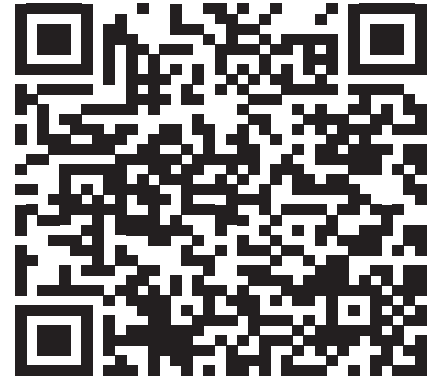
Cottonwood Heights is updating its General Plan—one of the city's most important guiding documents for shaping our community's future. This plan aims to establish a shared vision to guide decisions about land use, housing, transportation, economic development, parks and trails, water resources, and the community's overall quality of life. Over the past several months, the City Council and Planning Commission have worked together through a series of work sessions and subcommittees to develop draft vision statements, goals, and objectives

for each element of the plan.

Now it's your turn to help shape the future of Cottonwood Heights. We invite all residents to visit the new interactive General Plan engagement website (<https://tinyurl.com/39s95eav>) (see QR code) to review the draft vision statements, goals, and objectives and share your feedback. The online engagement portal will remain open through August 2026, giving residents an opportunity to participate.

In mid-September, the Planning Commission and City Council will reconvene in a joint work session to review and discuss the community feedback. Staff and the project consultant will then begin preparing the draft General Plan, which will be reviewed through a series of public meetings with the Planning Commission before moving into the formal public review and adoption process later this year.

Health in the Heights Update

Over the past several months, Health in the Heights ([Ch.Utah.Gov/Health-In-Heights](https://ch.utah.gov/health-in-heights)) has been working with schools, public health partners, parents, and community leaders to better understand the strengths and needs of youth in Cottonwood Heights.

The good news? Our community has a strong foundation! Overall, local youth report feeling safe, connected, and healthy in many areas. At the same time, our assessment identified opportunities to strengthen school engagement, support family connection, promote healthy choices around substance use, and improve youth well-being. These findings will help shape our Community Action Plan and future partnerships.

This summer, coalition members completed a Community Resource Assessment Report to share their findings and next steps. We invite

This fall, we'll share a Community Action Plan that details the evidence-based strategies and programs the coalition will pursue based on what we learned. By working together to build on our community's strengths, we can create even more opportunities for youth and families to thrive in Cottonwood Heights.

Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District Introduces New Payment System

The Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District has transitioned to a new online payment processing system through Point & Pay, following a competitive selection process designed to improve customer service, enhance security, and reduce processing costs.

AutoPay Customers – Action Required

If you were previously enrolled in AutoPay, you will need to re-enroll in the new system. Due to banking security and privacy requirements, customer banking information and existing AutoPay

authorizations could not be transferred from the previous payment provider.

Customers can manage their accounts, make payments, enroll in AutoPay, and sign up for paperless billing through the District's online payment portal. Be sure to have your WFWRD account number available when creating or accessing your account.

The District also encourages customers to take advantage of electronic, **paperless billing** and the convenience of **automatic payments**.

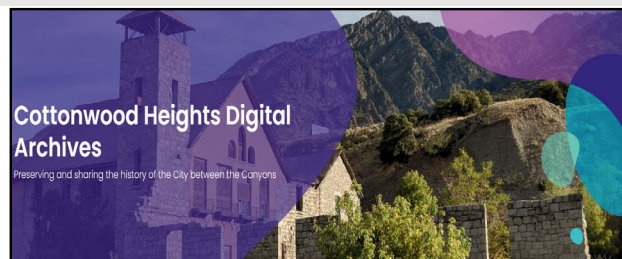
- **The Digital Archive:** We built and maintain a 24/7 online digital archive, bringing our community's history directly to your screens (available at <https://www.cottonwoodheights.utah.gov/community/history>).
- **Published City History:** We researched and published the official city history book, *City Between the Canyons*, which is currently available for purchase online and in-person at City Hall.
- **Historic Preservation:** Our team committee leads efforts to document

historic homes and buildings across the city so their legacies aren't lost to time.

- **Street-Level History:** We design and install historic signs throughout the community, providing residents with fascinating, on-the-spot historical context about where they live.
- **Community Exhibits:** Every year, we curate the historical exhibits for Butlerville Days and design the rotating displays in the City Hall lobby.
- **Local Storytelling:** We research and write the historical features you read every month right here in the city newsletter.
- **Oral Histories:** We conduct recorded interviews with elected officials and longtime residents, capturing invaluable first-hand memories and preserving them in our Digital Archive.

Serving on the committee is a fantastic way to collaborate with neighbors, influence how our city's story is told, and leave a lasting legacy for future generations.

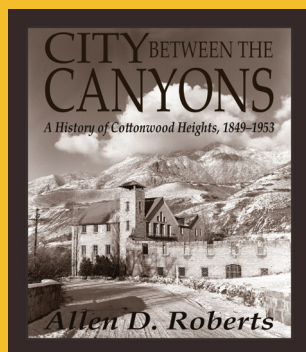

Wildfire Season in Utah: Be Prepared, Not Alarmed

Each summer, Utah experiences wildfire seasons as hot temperatures, dry vegetation, and windy conditions increase the risk of wildfires across the state. While news coverage can make wildfire season seem overwhelming, the good news is that there are simple steps every homeowner can take to reduce risk to protect their families and property. The first step is understanding your home's wildfire risk. Cottonwood Heights is located along the Wasatch foothills, where some neighborhoods are designated as part of the Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI)—areas where homes and natural vegetation meet. Residents living in or near these areas may face greater risk from wildfires, but preparation can make a significant difference. The Utah Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) Map is a valuable resource that allows residents to determine whether their property is located within a designated WUI area. Knowing your property's location can help guide landscaping decisions, home maintenance, and emergency preparedness planning.

Simple Ways to Prepare

A few proactive steps can go a long way toward improving your home's resilience during wildfire season:

- Keep roofs, gutters, and decks free of leaves, pine needles, and other combustible debris.
- Remove dead trees, shrubs, and dry vegetation from around your home.
- DO NOT THROW YOUR GREEN WASTE OVER FENCES ON TO PUBLIC OR STATE LANDS BEHIND OR BESIDE YOUR HOMES.
- If you or your gardener has moved green waste over property lines onto public or state lands, please remove these piles. With their accumulation over the years these piles create a greater hazard due to

their decomposition.

- Trim tree branches back to 10' from roofs, and chimneys. (We do not want people getting close to power lines due to the risk of electrical shock. However, if you feel that there is an issue with power lines on your property contact Rocky Mountain Power to assess the situation).
- Store firewood, propane tanks, and other combustible materials away from structures.
- Prepare an emergency "go bag" and develop a family evacuation plan before an emergency occurs.
- Sign up for local emergency alerts and stay informed during periods of elevated fire danger.
- Follow the State mandated fire restriction mandates regarding having recreational fires on your property.
- DO NOT BURN THE GREEN WASTE removed from your property (tree limbs, shrubs, dead vegetation).
- DO NOT USE WEED BURNERS to clear dry vegetation or shrubs.

Sustainability Starts with Resilience
Sustainability is not only about conserving resources but also creating resilient communities. Proper landscape maintenance, thoughtful plant selection, and routine property care help reduce wildfire risk while preserving the beauty of Cottonwood Heights. Small actions taken today can help protect homes, neighborhoods, and the natural environment for years to come. Residents are encouraged to explore the Utah Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) Map to better understand their property's wildfire risk and learn more about preparing their homes for wildfire season. ■
