The Rights and Duties of Citizenship

One of our most closely held rights is that of the right to vote. It's also a duty of citizenship. Unfortunately, far too many citizens don't seem to realize that elections occur more often than every four years. In elections where the office of President of the United States is not in the ballot, turn out is often low. In odd-numbered years and "mid term" elections, it's often much worse. This is troubling to me - not only as an elected official sworn to uphold the constitution, but as a citizen as well.

Election Day is coming next month (the 4th) and although it's not a presidential election, many key offices - that likely will have a greater impact on your life - are on our ballot. Each of Utah's four Congressmen is on the ballot as well as the Attorney General for the State. Considering all the press the AG's office has received over the last year or so and the National impact of some Utah laws working their way to the US Supreme Court, ensuring the office is filled by the right person is critical.

Other more local offices include seats in our Utah House of representatives. The Constitution






reserves significant power to the States, so the members of our State Legislature carry significant weight in creating the laws that affect our quality of life, our finances and our legacy. If you don't know who your representative is, you ought to get to know them. We have three that represent parts of the city. They are our neighbors too.

One of the seats on the Canyons School District is up for grabs. Our schools are core to our community values and quality of life and our children's future. Those that serve on the school board are integral to how our community functions. This is evidenced by the many cooperative efforts between the school district, city, and the Cottonwood Heights Recreational Center.

that takes care of our immediate public safety needs, we also have shared associations with the county sheriff's office, which has responsibility for the Jail, Canyon Patrol, search & rescue and other countywide services. As the Sheriff also provides police services (via UPD) in some areas of the county, it's key that the office coordinates well with city Police Chiefs in the county to ensure effective service across jurisdictions.

In case you're wondering, city offices (municipal elections) take place in odd numbered years. So, those of us in Cottonwood Heights have an election every November. Next year, we will elect

Playing it Safe


Preparation and fun were on hand at the Cottonwood Heights Public Safety Fair, held Thursday, Sept. 11 at Butler Park.

Neighborhood Watch and Emergency Preparedness Go Hand in Hand

Earlier this year, I was asked to be the Coordinator of Precinct 42 Emergency Preparedness in the Brighton District. I had been involved in the program five years ago. We have had block captains in place since then. We were able to obtain a C.E.R.T. trailer and stock it with essentials. We located it in the center of the neighborhood thanks to a willing homeowner; and it resides there today.

When asked to participate again this year, I wanted to bring new energy and excitement to the program. In discussing this with my good friend, Jim Jones, who volunteers with the Cottonwood Heights Police Dept. in the Neighborhood Watch program, I decided to develop our own N.W. program and incorporate it into our

existing Emer. Prep. Program. I found there was a high level of interest from the homeowners. We have had a few incidents in the neighborhood this year and people wanted to know what they could do to make the area safer.

We passed out flyers via the block captains announcing a Neighborhood Breakfast on May 31st. from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. in a familiar cul-de-sac. I coordinated the event with Sheila Jennings of the Police Dept. Sheila was also instrumental in getting neighborhood watch signs placed on all our entry streets.

For the event, we invited the police and fire departments to participate - and they manned their respective instructional booths. Much information was shared with the community on neighborhood

watch and Emergency Preparations. The Emergency Essentials company was there and demonstrated various types of water filters and how to use them.

Getting involved again in the neighborhood, I quickly discovered how valuable our Police Dept is as a resource. They want to assist us in keeping our neighborhoods safe.

Buying Drugs with Gift Cards

Gift Cards make nice gifts, and taking back unwanted gifts in exchange for gift cards is a great service offered by retailers. But it's also a new type of theft and criminals are taking advantage of store return policies.

CHPD is seeing large numbers of gift cards being pawned. We discovered most of these were never really purchased. Instead, stolen items from big box retailers were returned for in-store credit in the form of a gift card. We started seeing a large number of gift cards a couple of years ago from all types of different stores (Lowe's, Home Depot, Wal-Mart and Target) appearing for sale in pawn shops

Unfortunately, there is never a shortage of customers willing to be on the receiving end of the good deal.

People often ask me if it's illegal to buy these cards and the answer is no, unless you have knowledge the card was obtained by fraud or theft. The customer can call the toll free number or go on line and enter the card number to validate the balance. Although it's not illegal per se, most purchasers should know to be suspicious.

In the end, it's the consumer that ends up paying more for the product - so the increased theft impacts the honest customer. It's no surprise these suspicious gift cards are generating money used to purchase drugs.

Thieves will shoplift from a big box retailer then return the items without a receipt, getting a store credit gift card. They then sell the card online or at a pawn shop for usually 1/2 of face value.

and Secondhand Dealers Advisory Board Mike Katsanevas says his group recognizes the problem and has urged his members to avoid transactions involving gift cards.

Retailers are doing their best to make it more difficult for the thieves to obtain and

sell the gift cards. Many scan your Drivers License and look for suspicious patterns, but it's not difficult for savvy drug-motivated criminals to send different buddies in and target multiple retailers. We join with retailers and recommend that people only buy gift cards directly from the store or from a store with a section dedicated to selling gift cards. ■

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


A Doggone Good Time
