The Kimball/Wilson House is a one-story, single family, 1,365 square foot home built on a 0.19-acre lot. Its rectangular plan contains a living room, dining room, kitchen, three bedrooms and two baths. Real estate records state that it was built in 1950 while the tax card says an addition was built in 1955. Another source says the home was built in 1920. The tax card says it is built of concrete block walls. This is difficult to confirm since the outside walls have been stuccoed, concealing the underlying material, which seems to be masonry.

Visually the house is vernacular and non-descript in design and it could conceivably date anywhere from c. 1920 to c. 1950. The tax card shows a smaller, crosswing-planned building, around which is built to the right and rear a 15-foot wide addition. As a result, the original recessed porch is in the center of the floor plan rather than off to one side. It is possible that the original, crosswing home was a bungalow one that was modified later to take on its present appearance. The old tax card shows a simple, gabled structure but the present house sits entirely under a hip roof. That gabled section is still visible at the northwest corner of the house and it appears to be the first, 1920 or 1950 section. The hip roof and front and east side sections must be the 1955 addition, unless the addition to the plan was made in 1950 with the hip roof added in 1955.

The house is box-like in shape and situated under a medium-pitched hipped roof with cantilevered eaves. The stuccoed walls are painted dark gray. All of the windows are rectangular, either fixed or double-hung, plus a newer, projecting window extending from the rear wall. The plain exterior is devoid of ornament. The roof cornice has simple, flat board trim. Views of the exterior are obscured by trees, shrubs and fences on this overgrown lot. The dwelling is not architecturally distinctive.

This site is part of a larger parcel conveyed to Joseph S. Vance in 1882 through a homestead patent. Joseph Stephen/Stevens Vance was born in 1855 as one of the first born in the newly completed Union Fort of 1854. He is listed in the Territorial Census of 1856 as a Union Fort resident. He was the son of Isaac and Martha Vance, two of Union's first settlers. In 1895 Joseph married Lydia Alice Van Valkenberg of Union's prominent Peter Van Valkenberg family. She was born in 1860 in North Bend (Moroni), Sanpete County, Utah. A farmer with six children, Joseph Vance held the property until 1896 when he sold it to Frank B. and Lynette Stephens. Eventually the Vance family moved to Monrovia, California where he died in 1938.

Frank Bray and Lynette/Linette/Lunette Stephens apparently owned the property only briefly in 1896 before selling it that year to William H. and Lena M. Clapper Sheridan. Frank, born in about 1856 in Maine, was a lawyer who resided in Salt Lake City with his wife Lynette and three children. Never residing on this site, it may have been simply a real estate investment. Frank Stephens died in 1940.

The Sheridans too owned this lot only briefly in 1896 before selling in that year of Utah's Statehood to Martin E. Callahan. William Sheridan was a musician born in 1861. In 1893 he married Lena M. Clapper and they resided in Salt Lake City. Martin Edward Callahan was born in New York in 1858-59 to New York-residing parents from Ireland. In 1896 he married Jane M. Donnelley and they had at least seven children. Martin's early profession was a nurseryman, serving as manager and treasurer of Pioneer Nurseries. He later became a mechanic and then manager of a truck body factory. The family appears to have always lived in Salt Lake City or Murray.

Various court orders, mortgages, administrative and quiet claim deeds complicate the title report from 1910 to 1914 and the property goes back and forth between a Maggie B. Thompson/Thomson (there were at least a few by this name living in Salt Lake County at the time) and Henry T. and Margaret McEwan who, by 1921, owned the parcel and sold it to Quince/Prince K. Kimball.

Henry Thomas McEwan was born in 1859 of Scottish parents. In 1896, he married Margaret Ann Sharp, likely of Union's prominent pioneer Sharp family. A banker with at least six children, the McEwans seem always to have lived in Salt Lake City. Henry McEwan later had another wife, Lusannah J. McEwan. He died in 1937.

Starting in 1921, the next owners of the property were Quince/Prince K. and Mary E. Kimball. They took out a \$2,500 mortgage on the parcel in 1921 and then a \$6,500 mortgage on it the next year, so it may be that this is when the first, rear section of the house was built. Quince/Prince Knowlton Kimball was born in Utah in about 1867 while his wife, Mary Emily Kimball, was born in about the same year. They married in 1890 and had at least five children. Early on, Prince/Quince was a miner, then a grocery merchant, and by 1930, a mining investor. He died in 1949 in Sacramento, California.

In 1922 the Kimballs sold the property to L.B. Potter and Joseph Watkins, who the next year sold it to Lydia A. Holdaway, who the following year, 1924, sold it back to Quince K. Kimball. Then in 1928, Quince and Mary Kimball sold the property to Charles W. Gibbs. Through a court order, the property was conveyed to James L. White in 1940 and in 1944, he and his wife, Sarah, were the owners, selling it that year to George A. and Amy F. Faust.

L.B. Potter has not been identified and there were a few men named Joseph Watkins living in Salt Lake County at the time, but not at this address. They only owned the property for ten months in any event.

Lydia A. Riddle Holdaway was born in Beaver in about 1866/68. Her parents were Isaac and Mary Ann Knell Riddle. Her first husband was Andrew H. Holdaway, followed by husband Rasmus Peterson, whom she married in 1926. Lydia died in 1931 in Salt Lake City and she owned the property for only six months.

Charles Worthen Gibbs was born in 1885 to George Francis and Sarah Emaline Gibbs. His wife was Florence Gibbs. He was manager and cashier for a real estate company. He died in 1968 and seems to be another who held this lot as an investment property. The next owners, James Louis and Sarah S. White, also were Salt Lake City residents. Born in 1894, James was a lawyer who died in 1957. George Augustus and Amy F. Faust were the next owners, who kept the property for about 17 months. Born in about 1891 to James and Maude Wetzel Faust, he married Amy Finlayson in 1917. He was a county attorney and a judge. George died in 1955. One of their sons, James E. Faust, became a second counselor in the First Presidency of the L.D.S. Church. President Faust died in 2007 at age 87.

In 1945 the Fausts conveyed the property to Leo Valdemar and Fern Almira Anderton Larson. They owned it until 1950. Leo was born in 1916 in Pingree, Idaho to Johann L. and Almira Elizabeth Wright Larson and he married Fern in 1936. A later spouse was Julia Letha "Peg" Hatch Bullard Larson. A "driver," Leo died in 2004. In 1950, the Larsons sold the property to Theron Doyle and Lydia J. Barron. He was born in 1926 to James Clifford and Bessie Lucinda Barron. Theron died in 1992 in Hopwood, Mendocino, California. In 1953 the Barrons sold the property to Gardner S. and Carol Wilson. He was born in California in about 1919 to Joseph R. and Frances G. Jacobsen Wilson. Gardner was a "Pntr. Appr." (painter's apprentice?) in early manhood and was later a military policeman for the government. In 1959 the Wilsons took out a \$9,500 mortgage on the property and the next year they sold it to Franklin R. and Marguerite Carpenter.

There is a missing link in the title data between 1960 and 1976 when the property is shown being owned by Lynn and Helen R. Gordon. In 1994 the property was obtained by its present owners, Alan H. and Marilyn M. Branch.

Given the range of construction dates from c. 1920 to 1955, it is difficult to determine who built the original house. However, given all the mortgaging and buying and selling activity in 1921-22, it may be that the rear portion of the home was built then by Quince K. and Mary E. Kimball. If, as the tax card says, the house was built in 1950 and 1955, then the house may have been built for the Larson, Barron or Wilson family. Given the reduction in property size and the large mortgage taken out in 1959, we suggest that Gardner S. and Carol Wilson were responsible for the additions that constitute the present dwelling. Thus, for lack of better information, we call this the Kimball/Wilson Residence.

The Fisk Res. is a one-story, single family home on a 8,276 s.f. (.19 ac.) lot. The rectangular floor plan contains a living room, dining room, kitchen, 3 bedrooms & 2 bath rooms. (?) Real estate records say that the house was built in 1950 and renovated in 1992. The 1950 date corresponds to the year the Census (ST) Ward of the LDS Church Records issued a "Special Warranty Deed" for the house, about nearly two years after obtaining ownership thru an "Executor's Deed" from the estate of Hyrum Fisk. Judging by its appearance, however, the house could be a decade or two older. Visually, the exterior is reminiscent in design and roughly bungalow-like in shape, with its boxlike shape situated under a medium-pitched gable roof with cantilevered eaves. The exterior walls are built of conc. block, stuccoed and painted. All of its windows are rectangular, either fixed or double-hung, plus a (unusu?) projecting bay window extending from the _____. Wid South bought from Don and Lanore Searle a parcel of open land that had been owned by the Fetchner family. He built a house back in from 72nd S. and then built the Aitken's home and lived in it while his mother, "Grandma South," lived in the earlier, smaller dwelling. Later the homes of the Nelson, Rumel and Booth families also were built on the South property.

VANCE, Joseph Stephen and Lydia Ann Van Valkenburg

Another original land patent holder in Poverty Flats was Joseph Vance, son of Little Cottonwood pioneers Isaac Young and Martha Eleanor Yeager Vance. Joseph was born in Union Fort in 1854 and as a child, went to the North Bend/Moroni area of Sanpete County with his parents and other Union residents. He returned to Union, marrying local woman Lydia Ann Van Valkenburg. They remained long enough to receive their patent in 1882 but by 1890, they had moved to Idaho, apparently selling their property to Charles Denney. They spent their last decades in California. Joseph died there in Monrovia in 1938.

Otis L. Terry, Jr. was the third generation of Otis Terrys to live in Union. He was born in MillCreek in 1852 while his father was running the Gardner Flour Mill there. In 1876 he married Sarah Lovenia Howell, born in 1859 to Unionites Elias Willis and Martha Jane Rigby Howell. Their children were Otis Lysander III, Phylinda, Willis Elias, Martha Lovenia and Charles Delos.

Otis, Jr. served in the bishopric of the Union Ward under Bishop Ishmael Phillips until moving to Fairview in 1886. After leaving Union, Otis, Jr. married three more wives and fathered additional children. He died in 1932 after being hit by an automobile while crossing a street. Sarah had died in 1898.

* VANCE, Isaac Young and Martha Eleanor Yager

Vance arrived in Utah in 1847 and was one of the original settlers of Little Cottonwood. He was born in 1818 in Clay County, Tennessee. Vance was one of only four family heads to stay in the area beyond 1853, helping to build Union Fort in '54. His experience must not have been fully satisfying, however, as he was in the group (with James Naylor Jones, Elisha Jones and Union's Jehu Cox and Warren and Lindsay Brady) to obtain Brigham Young's permission to establish the settlement of North Bend (later, Fairview) in 1859. Vance, Cox and the others made the move to Sanpete County and there Vance was involved as a militiaman in the two Indian-Mormon wars. After helping to build Union Fort, he again became a fort-builder in Fairview and Mt. Pleasant, also living in Milburn. The adobe house he constructed in 1870 in Fairview remains extant. Isaac Vance died in Sanpete in 1898 and was buried in Mt. Pleasant.

WEBB, Charles Young and Laura A. Smith, Margaret Allen and Adeline Freeman

Charles Y. Webb is shown as a property owner in Union in the 1850s. He was born in 1819 in Malone, New York to Samuel and Polly Webb. He converted to Mormonism in 1844 and lived in Nauvoo with his first wife, Laura A. Smith, who died of childbirth in 1846. Webb then married Margaret Allen and joined the Mormon Battalion, eventually retrieving his family and bringing them to Utah in 1849. He was an early settler in Little Cottonwood but responded to a call to colonize in Parowan and moved there in 1850-51. Webb took a third wife, Adeline Freeman, and by his three wives had 17 children, most of whom lived to adulthood. Why he still owned land in Union after he had moved south is an open question. He may have left one family in Union while taking a second one to the Parowan/Paragonah area where he settled.

WILLIS, William Wesley, Sr. and Jane Willis and Frances Long Reeves Sweat

Ann Poulson (1839-1909) of Provo. His final marriage was to Caroline Delight Allen (1838-1879). Altogether Elisha fathered 25 children in the 45 years between 1832 and 1877. Two of them, Jacob Absolom (born 1851) and Margaret Ellen (born 1853) were born in Little Cottonwood but by 1854 Elisha had moved his family to Provo and by 1857, they were in Mt. Pleasant and shortly thereafter, in North Bend/Fairview. He ended his life in Heber City where he served as bishop of its East Ward. An Indian War veteran, Elisha Jones also served as a justice of the peace. He died in Heber City in 1880.

KELSEY, Samuel Alexander Pagan/Pagon and Jennet Averett

A "S.A.P. Kelsey" is shown as a lot owner on the 1857 plat map of Union Fort. He was Samuel Alexander Pagan or Pagon Kelsey, son of Irish parents Samuel and Elenor Gill Kelsey. He was born in 1805 in Chester County, South Carolina. His wife, Jennet Averitt, was born in 1808 in Maury County, Tennessee. Converted to Mormonism in about 1835, the Kelseys lived in Nauvoo where their first four children were born and died. Those they brought with them to Utah in 1852 were Thomas, Diannah, Matilda Elmira, Elenor Jennet and John Averitt. With other Unionites, the family moved to Cache County in 1860 where they helped colonize Smithfield. A blacksmith by profession, Samuel died there in 1894, while Jennet had passed on in 1887. (It is not clear whether S.A. P. Kelsey was related to Union pioneer Easton Kelsey, who arrived in Utah at the head of his own company a year earlier.)

MAXFIELD, Richard Dunwell and Artemisia Ann Harris and Ellen Diadema Thompson

One of the sons of John Ellison and Sarah Maxfield to settle in the Union/Butler area was Richard D. Maxfield. He was born in 1831 in Wilmont Creek, Bedeque, Prince Edward Island, Canada and came to Utah with his parents in 1851. By his two wives he fathered 20 children, 9 with Artemesia Harris and 11 with Ellen Thompson. When living in Union Fort in 1870, Richard was a man of considerable wealth, claiming a total of \$5,000 in land and personal assets. The land was likely the 160 acres he obtained in 1878 at the northwest corner of Section 27. The parcel ran south from today' 70th South between 20th and 23rd East.

Richard Maxfield farmed his land. He supplemented that income by cutting lumber for the roof of the Salt Lake Tabernacle, owning four sawmills up Big Cottonwood Canyon and being a partner with his brother Robert in the Maxfield Mine in the same canyon. He and his two families were still living in Union in 1880. In about 1900 they moved to Spring City, Utah where he was a lumberman. By 1910 he was widowed and living in Salt Lake City.

MERRILL, Horatio Harris and Jeannette Webb

Born in 1834 in Alden, New York, Horatio Merrill arrived in Utah in 1850 with his parents Austin Taylor and Laura Wilder Harris Merrill. With the rest of his family, he lived in Little Cottonwood and then Union Fort where he became a wheelwright and carpenter. In the early 1860s, Horatio joined other Unionites who moved to Smithfield in Cache County. In 1861 he married Jeanette Webb, born in 1846 to Union residents Charles Young and Margaret Allen Webb. They had two children, Laura Margaret and Horatio Epaphras, before Laura died in 1865, the year of her last child's birth. In Smithfield Horatio later married Danish-born, fifteen-year-old, Martha Mouritsen and then Sarah Ann Smith, fathering another eight children between them from 1868-1891. Late in life Horatio Merrill joined the Mormon colonization effort in Arizona. In 1894 he was killed in an Indian ambush near Pima.

MERRILL, Ira Elias and Lucinda Jane Olmstead

The January, 1857 plat map of Union Fort shows that one of its lot-owners was Ira E. Merrill. Born in 1835 in Alden, New York to Union pioneers Austin S. and Laura Wilder Harris Merrill, Ira came to Utah in 1848 with Brigham Young's second company. The family located in Little Cottonwood in 1849, farming their land two miles south of the fort. In 1851 they obtained another farming parcel a mile further south in what is now Sandy.

In 1856 Ira married Lucinda Jane Olmstead in Union Fort. Although the daughter of Hyrum and Eliza Winter Olmstead, she was given to and raised in the family of Union pioneer Alexander M. Shoemaker. Their first two children, Lucinda Jane (born 1857) and Ira William (born 1858) were born at Union Fort but in 1859, the Merrills joined with other Union families who responded to a call to colonize Smithfield, five miles north of Logan in Cache County.

PENDELTON, Benjamin Franklin and Lavina Patten, Alice Jeffery

Born in 1818 in Cansteo, New York, Benjamin Pendleton married Lavina Patten in 1840, converted to Mormonism in 1842 and moved to Nauvoo where he set up his blacksmith shop. The parents of eight children, they traveled west with Brigham Young's second/return company in 1848. He set up another blacksmith shop and a home in the heart of the city, also maintaining a lot in Union Fort. It may have provided a household for his second family after marrying Alice Jeffery in 1861 and fathering eight more children. A very useful man, Pendleton used his skills to make and repair machinery for molasses, grist and saw mills and to repair weapons. In 1861 he
