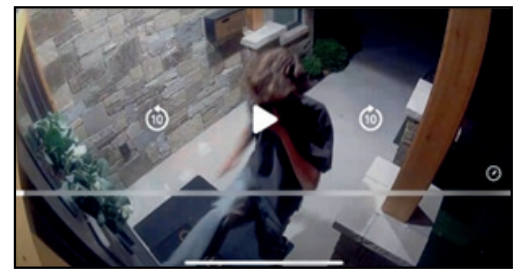


A new wave of social media “challenges” circulating on platforms like Facebook and TikTok is pushing juvenile pranks into dangerous and costly territory.

One recent trend involves kids filming themselves running through vinyl fencing in the middle of the night. While some may see this as a harmless joke, the damage to property can be expensive for homeowners and, under Utah law, is classified as criminal mischief – a charge that can result in arrest

and a criminal record.

Even more concerning is another trend where individuals record themselves, faces concealed, attempting to kick in front doors during the night. Beyond the obvious property damage and potential criminal charges, this type of behavior can have deadly consequences. A startled homeowner may reasonably perceive such an act as a home invasion, putting everyone involved at serious risk.



While social media trends can seem like harmless fun, these particular stunts are anything but, they are dangerous, illegal, and could change lives in an instant. Parents, please talk with your children about the real-world consequences of participating in these challenges. The likes and views are never worth the cost. ■

Don't "fall" into the habit of blowing or raking leaves into the street. Keep leaves and debris out of the gutter. This will reduce the chance a storm drain will get clogged and will reduce the amount of bacteria getting into our creeks. ■

Contamination Affects Everyone—Let’s Recycle Right

Keeping our recycling stream clean is more important than ever. Tipping and disposal fees account for nearly 20% of the District’s annual operating costs. By reducing waste and keeping recycling clean, residents play a key role in managing these costs.

When non-recyclable items are placed in recycle containers, it increases processing fees at the Material Recovery Facility (MRF). Every ton of contaminated material adds to those fees and impacts the entire District. By reducing contamination in the recycle stream, we can keep recycling efficient, affordable, and sustainable.

Here’s how you can help:

- **Recycle Right:** Place only clean, dry, accepted materials in your recycle container. Always flatten boxes and never bag recyclables. No plastic bags, food waste, or non-recyclable items.
- **Reduce Waste:** Use reusables whenever possible, buy in bulk to reduce packaging, and donate items instead of throwing them away.
- **Set Bins Out Only When Needed:** If your container isn’t full, consider skipping a pickup. This helps lower fuel use and reduce equipment wear.
- **Place Bins Out by 7:00 AM:** Setting your containers out by 7:00 AM helps ensure they’re collected on time and reduces the need for return trips—saving fuel and limiting wear on trucks and equipment.



- **Go Paperless:** Switch to e-billing through your Xpress Bill Pay account or contact our office at **info@wfwrdutah.gov** or (385) 468-6625.

Even small changes add up. Together, we can keep services affordable and sustainable.

2025 Water Conservation Plan Meeting Notice

Salt Lake City Department of Public Utilities (SLCDPU) is seeking input on the 2025 Water Conservation plan. SLCDPU updates the plan every five years to meet state requirements and ensure efforts are in line with reducing water use, increasing water use efficiency, and eliminating water waste.

The goals in the 2025 Water Conservation Plan are to:

- Keep on track to meet long-term water supply needs.
- Facilitate efforts to increase resource and system resilience in the face of identified risks, including climate change.
- Encourage the continued wise use of water, an important limited resource; and
- Be consistent with conservation goals established by the State, Central Utah Project, Alliance for Water Efficiency, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Back to School, Back in Time: The History of Cottonwood Heights Schools

As September settles in, the back-to-school routine is in full swing for families across Cottonwood Heights. But as students walk through the doors of their schools, how often do we consider the long history of those institutions? Most of our schools existed long before the community incorporated in 2005, and their stories reflect the incredible growth and evolution of our city.

The school with the longest continuous history is Butler Elementary, founded in 1877. While it has deep roots, it also boasts one of the newest buildings, completed in 2016. With its stunning 360-degree views, the innovative architecture is the latest chapter in over a century of educational experimentation that began with one-room schoolhouses. Other schools have seen their own evolution; Oakdale Elementary, for instance, once experimented with an "open plan" classroom design with few permanent walls before being rebuilt in a more traditional style.

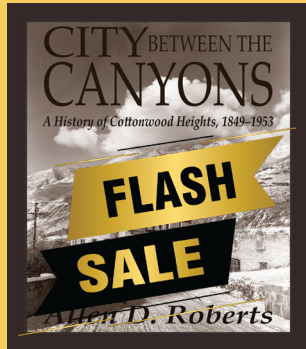
More recently, our schools have adapted to a booming K-12 population. Brighton High School, founded in 1969, was completely rebuilt in 2022 into a three-story, state-of-the-art facility to house its nearly 2,400 students.



Beyond construction, our schools continue to make news for their excellence. Just this year, Bella Vista Elementary was honored as a National Blue Ribbon School, a prestigious distinction awarded to only a few hundred schools nationwide. This award is a testament to the outstanding quality of education in our community.

Unlike many areas, the school-age population in Cottonwood Heights is thriving. From historic one-room schoolhouses to award-winning modern facilities, our schools continue to be the heart of our community, constantly adapting to serve new generations. ■

Growing Sustainability in Cottonwood Heights: Water-Wise Landscaping for a Thriving Community

As Utah continues to face cycles of drought and steady population growth, Cottonwood Heights is taking proactive steps to ensure our community remains vibrant and resilient. One of the most effective—and attractive—ways residents can contribute is by adopting water-wise landscaping, in alignment with the City’s landscaping requirements.

Under the Cottonwood Heights landscape ordinance, new and redeveloped landscapes must prioritize water-efficient design. This includes replacing non-functional turf with native or drought-tolerant plants, grouping plants with similar water needs, and installing efficient irrigation systems such as drip lines. The code also limits the use of high-water turf in park strips and other non-recreational areas, helping to conserve our precious water resources.

Water-wise landscaping, sometimes called “localscaping,” can reduce outdoor water use by up to 60%. Beyond water savings, it lowers

utility costs, decreases yard maintenance, and supports the City’s sustainability goals. Mulching, maintaining healthy soil, and using trees and shrubs adapted to our local climate can further boost landscape performance.

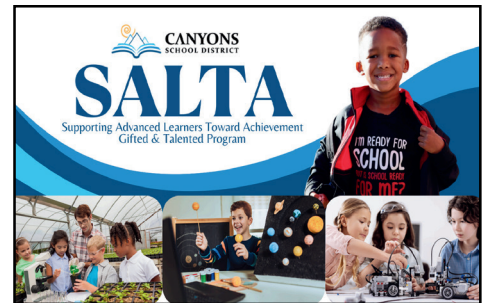
