## Our Valuable Relationship With Canyons School District

A recent article in *The Salt Lake Tribune* highlighted the Top 10 stadiums in the state of Utah to watch a football game. Brighton High School not only

made the list but it's ranked at No. 2. It is another recognition that makes us proud of Brighton High, which we view as "our" high school as it is the only one located in Cottonwood Heights. We love to bask in the glow of the limelight of recognitions given to our students, faculty and administration – even that our football stadium, with its amazing views of the Salt Lake Valley and Wasatch Front, is among the Top 10 best stadiums in the state!

From 2006 to 2008, a committee of Mayors worked to form a new school district splitting from the Jordan School District. The citizens of Sandy, Midvale, Cottonwood Heights, Draper and Alta voted affirmatively to form the new Canyons School District. The new district began providing educational services on July 1, 2009.

In the 13 years since the city incorporated this was one of the most important developments for our community. The ongoing relationship between Canyons and the communities it serves is at the heart of better use of tax dollars, cooperative use of facilities and better service of our mutual constituencies.

Many misunderstood the motivations behind the formation of the Canyons District. The most common misunderstanding was that the east side of the Jordan District was attempting to avoid financial



obligations to help with the construction of schools on the west side of the district. The truth is that there was an expectation that 20 percent of the 2003 \$280 million bond would be used to pay for renovations of older schools. In the end, only 3 percent went to renovations.

Most property owners in Cottonwood Heights continue to pay on that 2003 bond (unless you were originally in Granite District). Our tax obligation under the bond continues to decline from now until the bonds are retired in 2023. But the point is 97 percent of that bond was used for schools on the west side of Jordan District for which we are still paying without complaint.

While we agree that paying off the Jordan bond is our shared obligation, the main motivation for the creation of Canyons District was to assure that the ongoing and future facility and educational needs of students in our community were being met. Furthermore, there was a strong desire for a better working relationship with "our" school district.

After eight years of operation, we feel that our goals of better facilities and education for our students are being achieved and we have a fabulous relationship with the Canyons School District. Here are a few key examples of how our relationship has been beneficial for our citizens.

**No Tax Increases** - In eight years there has been no statutory tax increase imposed by Canyons School District.

**New Facilities** - A new bond issued by Canyons was structured in a way to overlay existing retiring debt so that no new taxes were required to build over \$250 million in projects. Among those projects were a new Butler Middle School, a new Butler Elementary School, improvements at other elementary schools

in the city, new tennis courts, a new football field and soccer field, and improvements at Brighton High including a new building. Keep in mind that prior to Canyons we had dilapidated schools and two closed elementary schools. When young families were looking to move into our community, the condition of the school facilities was a strong negative which reduced the appeal of this area. The new facilities have had just the opposite effect, increasing the appeal of this area along with enrollment of the schools located within the city's boundaries.

**New Parks** - We worked cooperatively to convert the closed Mountview Elementary School on Fort Union into the new Mountview Park. Our lease of that land from the district is \$1 per year. We were able to work closely with the District to exchange a community eyesore

for a park that has become one of the most popular in the area. It is an amenity that attracts people to Cottonwood Heights and makes our community a more desirable place to live. In addition, we were able to work jointly with the District to convert the old Cottonwood Heights Elementary into more green space for Butler Park as well as add the new tennis courts on Bengal Boulevard.

**New Theater** - As the new Butler Middle was being built we contributed

financially to build a larger, state-of-the-art auditorium and theater that the community could use in the summer and during the school year for community events. This joint use of the facility has been a great partnership and made better use of a taxpayer asset. Our model is now being duplicated in other cities in Canyons School District.

**Excellent Working Relationship** - Superintendent Jim Briscoe, a Cottonwood Heights resident, values highly the relationship with the communities the District serves. He has made it a repeated theme of his administration to work closely with us. That relationship allows us to do many things together from supporting school career fairs, to telephone pole banners, to providing law enforcement support and sharing facilities. Last spring, then-Congressman Jason Chaffetz

scheduled a town hall meeting at City Hall. Once we realized City Hall was inadequate to hold the crowds, we quickly called the District for assistance. They turned on a dime to accommodate us. Such a relationship between city and school district is symbiotic in so many ways, not the least of which is coordinating our efforts to serve a common constituency.

We are so grateful for the teachers and administrators at Canyons School District. Schools are the heart of any community. We are proud of our five elementary schools (Ridgecrest, Oakdale, Bella Vista, Butler and Canyon View), Butler Middle School and Brighton High School (and its newspaper-noteworthy football stadium). We believe the quality of education and facilities offered to our citizens by Canyons District is a big reason why our area is such a desirable place to be.

I extend my personal thanks to those I have worked with at Canyons District. They are too numerous to name, but the two superintendents, Dave Doty and Jim Briscoe, along with board members representing the city Kim Horiuchi, Tracy Cowdell, Kevin Cromar, Nancy Tingey, and Amber Shill have all been great friends to the city. As CSD begins its ninth year in operation, I encourage us all to claim Canyons as "our" district and show the teachers and the administrators, as well as our students, how much we appreciate their contributions to our community and that we share in the pride of their numerous accomplishments. ■

# Road Construction Updates

## Wasatch Blvd. "High T" Intersection

Construction of a new "High T" intersection began in late August and is expected to last through the fall. In late September or early October, **Wasatch Boulevard will be closed in both directions for three weeks** at the La Caille turn off, while the transition to Little Cottonwood Road (SR 210) will remain open, giving drivers direct access to Little Cottonwood Canyon. Commuters should expect delays as crews update the intersection to improve traffic flow in the area.

## Ft. Union Blvd. Water Line

Salt Lake City Water crews have delayed a pipe replacement on Fort Union Boulevard between 3000 East and Wasatch Drive. The project will begin in April of 2018.



## Wasatch Blvd./Giverny Road Improvements

Crews will continue to work along Wasatch Boulevard as the Giverny residential development continues to take shape near 9100 South. The project will widen the road, install utility services/infrastructure and add bike

lanes. The road improvement is anticipated to be completed by the end of autumn. **Daily road closures from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. are expected between Sept. 5-8.**

## Primary Narrows Candidates for Nov. 7 Election

Final candidates for two city council seats were selected during a primary election on Aug. 15.

On Aug. 29, the \*unofficial count was as follows:

In the race for City Council Third District, Michael Hanson prevailed with 691 votes while Tali Bruce came in second (385 votes), only fifteen votes ahead of Tonia Dalton (369 votes). Hanson will face Bruce in the general election.

In the Fourth District, Christine Mikell garnered 70 percent of the ballots cast (1164 votes), while Eric Kraan (267 votes) narrowly defeated Aaron Thomson (229 votes). Mikell will face Kraan in the November election.

Since only two mayoral candidates filed to run, no primary was necessary between Tim Hallbeck and Mike Peterson, who will face off against each other in November.

Cottonwood Heights utilized voting by mail

for the primary and will use the same system for the Municipal Election on Nov. 7. Ballots will be mailed the week of Oct. 10. Voters may also cast ballots at county polling locations on Election Day, including Cottonwood Heights City Hall.

# Revel Big Cottonwood Canyon Marathon and Half Marathon Coming to Cottonwood Heights

Cottonwood Heights is proud to welcome the 6th annual Revel Big Cottonwood Canyon Marathon and Half Marathon to our city. This is the fifth year that Cottonwood Heights has

hosted this popular event that draws participants from around the country as well as locally.



This prestigious race is one of the qualifying events for the Boston Marathon, considered one of the world's premiere races.

The Revel Big Cottonwood Canyon Marathon and Half Marathon will start early in the morning on Saturday, Sept. 9. We invite all to come out to support the runners and cheer them on to the finish line.

Traffic along Fort Union Boulevard will be restricted from the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon, all the way to Union Park Avenue. Some traffic will be allowed east and west along Fort Union Boulevard, but no traffic or pedestrians will be allowed to cross north and south along the race route until it is finished.

Traffic along Wasatch Boulevard will be restricted between Fort Union Boulevard and 4500 South during the race. See map for race route details.

If you have plans that don't include participation in the race, either as a runner or a spectator, please plan your travel accordingly.

The race begins at the top of Big Cottonwood Canyon (at Guardsman Pass for the full marathon and the Spruces Campground for the half marathon) at 6:45 a.m.

All runners should complete the course by 1:30 p.m. The Cottonwood Heights Police Department will open parts of Fort Union Boulevard as the race winds down. The intersection of Wasatch and Fort Union should be open by approximately 11 a.m. with other intersections opening as the race proceeds west down Fort Union.

Here are suggested detour routes for travelers on both sides of Fort Union: For those on the north side, the best route is to take I-215 to Union Park. For those on the south side, Creek Road or 9400 South may be the best option to reach 1300 East.

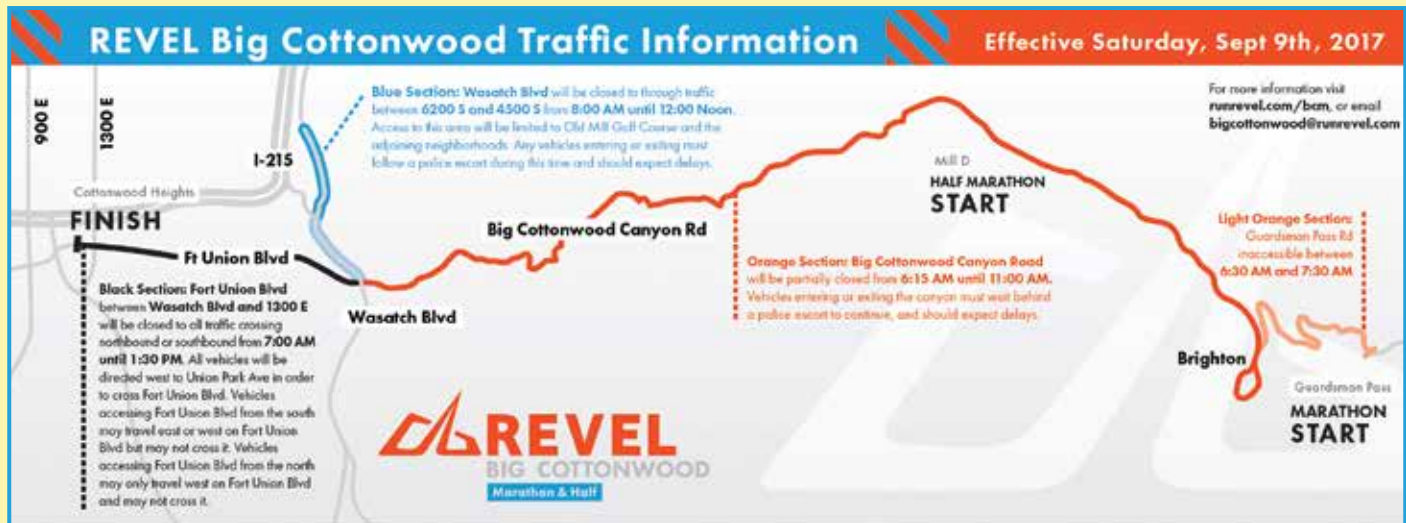

**BLACK SECTION:** Fort Union Blvd. between Wasatch Blvd. and 1300 East will be closed to all traffic crossing northbound or southbound from 7 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. All vehicles will be directed west to Union Park Ave. in order to cross Fort Union Blvd. Vehicles accessing Fort Union Blvd. from the south may travel east or west on Fort Union Blvd. but may not cross it. Vehicles accessing Fort Union Blvd. from the north may only travel west on Fort Union Blvd. and may not cross it.

**BLUE SECTION:** Wasatch Blvd. will be closed to through traffic between 6200 South and 4500 South from 8 a.m. until noon. Access to this area will be limited to Old Mill Golf Course and the adjoining neighborhoods. Any vehicles entering or exiting must follow a police escort during this time and should expect delays.

**ORANGE SECTION:** Big Cottonwood Canyon Road will be partially closed from 6:15 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Vehicles entering or exiting the canyon must wait behind a police escort to continue, and should expect delays.

**LIGHT ORANGE SECTION:** Guardsman Pass Road is inaccessible between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 a.m.



## NORTH OF FORT UNION:

There will only be one westbound lane open on the north side of Fort Union Blvd. Use I-215 westbound to Union Park Ave. in order to bypass the closure across Fort Union Blvd. No vehicles will be able to cross Fort Union Blvd. between Wasatch Blvd. and Union Park Ave.

## SOUTH OF FORT UNION

The south side of Fort Union Blvd. will still be open for westbound and eastbound traffic, with limited lanes. Use Fort Union Blvd. or Creek Road westbound to Union Park Ave. in order to cross Fort Union Blvd. No vehicles will be able to cross Fort Union Blvd. between Wasatch Blvd and Union Park Ave.

# Back to School, Back to Safety

This article is an effort to increase awareness of possible safety issues that are associated with our kids returning to school. Most of the information provided comes from Safe Kids USA.

Being proactive is a very important step. Please schedule time to talk to your children and make a plan. For those of you whose children will be walking to and from school, walk the route with them to identify hazards. If there are route options, select the one that has the least number of traffic crossings and intersections. Children under the age of 10 should only cross streets with an adult. Streets should only be crossed at intersections

or corners and the use of traffic signals and crosswalks should be mandated with your children. Crossing mid-street, running out into streets or crossing between parked cars is very dangerous. Distracting conversations should be brought to a halt while preparing to cross or while crossing streets, in order to enable 100 percent awareness and focus during street crossings.

Drivers of vehicles are asked to be aware of increased pedestrian traffic at key times of day. Please slow down during these times and be especially alert in residential areas and school zones. Be especially alert and take the time to look for kids at intersections, in medians, curbs and driveways. Please be aware that kids make mistakes and errors in judgment.



Continue to reduce distractions inside your car in order to concentrate on the road and your surroundings. Please put down your phone and don't talk or text while driving.

Teach and model these safety issues and behaviors to your kids. Taking the time to walk routes, talk about potential hazards, set the tone for expectations and behaviors creates ownership on behalf of our kids who walk to and from school.

Let's be proactive, parents and guardians! Thank you and as always, stay safe. ■

# CH Couple Saves Injured Man During Race



Cottonwood Heights residents Jeffery and Traci Andreason had been training for several months in anticipation for the Spartan Race, a grueling challenge involving

running and climbing through all kinds of muddy conditions.

The race was held at Nordic Valley in Weber County on Aug. 5. A few minutes into the race, Traci heard a noise that sounded like something crashing down the mountain. When they investigated, the Andreasons found one of the race volunteers, a medic, had crashed an ATV 200 feet down the rough mountain terrain and was seriously injured.

Traci, a registered nurse who also works in

Cottonwood Heights, gave the injured man medical attention as Jeffery lifted him from the vehicle. Without cellphones or a radio, the Andreasons were able to flag down a few other runners who alerted rescue authorities from the Weber County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team. Traci and Jeffery stayed with the man until he was lifted from the canyon by a Life Flight helicopter crew. He was eventually flown to a nearby hospital with serious injuries.

The Andreasons spent about three hours with the crash victim, sacrificing their spots in the race, but Traci says they were in the "right place at the right time" and are grateful the man is expected to make a full recovery. ■



## Truck Safety

Many schools are gearing up for the new school year. Whenever your routine is altered, it is sometimes difficult to realign your schedule and remember everything that you need to accomplish. Drivers with the Wasatch

Front Waste & Recycling District are aware of the influx of schoolchildren going to and coming from school, and are always looking out for their safety. Edward Charles Tucker was born September 26, 1868, in Salt Lake City. As a young man, he worked in the dairy industry, farming and construction. He also worked on the Salt Lake and Fort Douglas Railway and other railroads in Colorado, before attending the Salt Lake Academy. After school Ed, moved to Ashley, Utah, where he learned the brick mason trade. He married Jane Elizabeth Butler, the daughter of Alva Butler and Jane Elizabeth Labrum, of Butler, in 1897. They lived in several homes in the area before settling in the area known as Poverty Flats in 1910 (1844 E. 7000 South). Ed was a master builder and built many of the homes and other buildings in the communities of Butler and Union. He also assisted in building the Alvin and Annie Green House located on Danish Road, that is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Throughout his life, Ed was active in both church and civic affairs. ■
