#### 4 ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Real estate records give a construction date of 1937 for this house (The date is missing on the tax card.), although it appears to have been remodeled and expanded then from an existing c. 1890s Victorian home. That it was the latter is apparent from its form and crosswing floor plan, plus its old, red-orange brick, worn trim and filled-in, old window openings.

It appears that the property value increased five times between June of 1937 and November of 1939 when a mortgage of \$2,500 was secured. This significant increase in value suggests that the dwelling remodeled and expanded between those years, in part supporting the 1937 date.

Other features supporting the 1937 date are the home's truncated-gable roof on the north, its large, shed dormer, plain, flat-board trim, light-painted brick walls and mid-century modern window treatment, especially at the northwest corner of the main floor. The two-story tall chimney along the north wall appears to have been added later, as was the small, one-story addition at the northeast corner.

The Colebrook House is 1-1/2-stories high and contains ten major rooms including two bedrooms and two baths. It has 1,904 square feet of finished floor area plus a 567 s.f. unfinished basement. It was remodeled in 1994. The home sits on a quarter-acre lot. Also on the site is a mid-to-late 20th Century garage, 570 s.f. in size.

The present front façade of the house looks identical to its appearance on an old, undated tax card, except for the changing of the dormer window to a tripartite one. Thus the house retains its historic, c. 1937 architectural integrity.

Again, it is possible that this is an older, Victorian Era crosswing house, substantially remodeled and expanded about 1937. When it was sold in 1881, the purchase price was \$1,100, an amount that might have been appropriate then for a lot with a dwelling. In this event, the house would have been built by one of the Spillitt, Sanford or Newman families. However, this house looks somewhat younger than 1881, so the \$1,100 may have applied to a larger parcel of land and/or an earlier house, no longer extant.

The original owner of this property was William M. Sanford who, even before receiving a homestead patent for it in 1878, sold it to James Spillett in 1875. Sanford was born in Ohio in about 1840, son of an English father and Ohioan mother. A farmer, he was also the co-developer of the important Brown-Sanford Ditch Company. This company was the leading builder

of irrigation canals and ditches in the Butler area, taking water out of Big Cottonwood canyon after the Morse Decree was issued. Their three major ditches were the two forks and a branch of the Brown & Sanford Ditch, each running east-to-west from the canyon across the Butler bench and beyond. These ditches and their small north-to-south lateral ditches made farming viable throughout the upper Butler and Poverty Flats area.

In 1878 Sanford homesteaded 160 acres on both sides of Bengal Boulevard between 23rd and 27th East. He lived there a few years before disappearing, "being driven out by his wife" (Sarah), who filed for divorce in 1890. By 1880 they were living in the area with their eight children. While there Sanford farmed his land, which benefitted from his irrigation ditches. He sold parcels of land to the Bowthorpe, MAXfield and Newman families, as well as this parcel to James Spillett.

James Spillett was born in Faversham, Kent, England in 1835, the son of Benjamin and Sarah Gregory Spillett, and came to Utah in 1853 at age seventeen. He and his wife, Jane Rosetta Spillett were both from England and they had six children, at first residing in the Big Cottonwood/Holladay area, as well as Moroni. A farmer and Utah Indian War veteran, Spillett granted a \$300 mortgage on the property to local resident Joseph Newman on the same day he obtained it in 1875 and then sold it in 1881 to Ellen D. Maxfield for \$1,100, an amount suggesting that the land had been improved by the addition of a house. His family later moved to Idaho where he died in Rockland, Power County in 1915.

Joseph Partridge Newman appeared not to own this parcel in 1875 but perhaps used the mortgage money to secure equipment to farm it. He did eventually own and farm his own land in Butlerville. Born in England in 1845 to Joseph and Elizabeth Hughes Newman, he came to Utah in 1853 and married Elizabeth Moses, born c. 1840 in Iowa. They too resided in Big Cottonwood/Holladay just north of Butler.

Ellen Diadamia Maxfield was the wife of lumberman, miner and farmer Richard Dunwell Maxfield (1831-1916), son of the first Maxfields to settle in Butlerville, John Ellison and Sarah Elizabeth Baker Maxfield, from England and Canada, respectively. Ellen was born in Genesee County, New York in 1838 to George Vaughn and Lucia Thompson. They had at least eight children but in the 1880 census, she is listed as living without a husband, and when buys this property in 1881 and sells it in 1885, she does it without a husband. This may be because Richard had another, first wife, Artemessa Ann Smoot (Harris) Maxfield and family, and during this period of polygamy persecution, some chose to live separately from their later families. Ellen and Richard did end up living together in Spring City by 1900. She died in 1909 and he in 1916.

In 1885 Ellen Maxfield sold the property to Charles Colebrook for \$375. He lost it to Salt Lake County in the Depression year of 1933 due to non-payment of taxes but got it back in June of 1937. He and his wife Sarah then sold it to their son, Lewis C. Colebrook and his wife Lucy E. Colebrook, in 1939. Later that year the latter took out a mortgage of \$2,500 on the property, suggesting that it now included substantial improvements, most likely the remodeling and expansion of the house. It appears that the house was built either in the 1890s for Charles and Sarah Colebrook, or in 1939-40 by Lewis and Lucy E. Colebrook, or, as we believe, both. Thus we name it after both Colebrook families.

Sometime after 1884, newly married Charles C. and Sarah McGhie Colebrook built their first house on the southwest corner of what became known as Colebrook Corner, located at the intersection of 20th East and 70th South (now Highland Drive and Ft. Union Blvd.). Here they and later their son, Lewis, and their grandchildren built their homes, creating a small family sub-neighborhood. Others in the area were the Buxton, Wiseman, Baker, Harris, Gates, Cullis, Millard and Hennenkamp families.

In 1884 Charles C. Colebrook married Butler native Sarah McGhie, born in Provo in 1866. Their sole child was Lewis Charles (1885-1957) who married local Butlerville woman Lucy Brady (1887-1958) in 1904. Charles was a railroad builder who helped construct four railroad lines in Utah, one in Wyoming and one in Montana. He served three years as a Jordan School District board member and for twelve years on the old 57th District School Board. Charles worked as a constable and county road supervisor and as a founder and director of the Brown and Sanford Ditch Company. He was a farmer and active church man, serving for six years as bishop of the L.D.S. Butler Ward. Colebrook was still working on his farm when he died in 1943.

Lewis Charles Colebrook was born in Butler. A farmer, by 1930 he and his wife Lucy had six children at home, plus two of the neighbor Buxton children. They were living in a rented house on 28th East at the time. By 1940 they were living in a home at 7233 South 2300 East, about 2 blocks north of the subject home of this survey, located at 7447 S. 2300 E. Were they two different houses or the same house with the addresses having been changed? In 1941 they lived in yet another house, at 7050 Highland Drive. What is lacking is evidence that either Charles or Lewis and their families lived at the 7447 S. 2300 E. dwelling.

In 1941, the year they were living on Highland Drive, Lewis and Lucy Colebrook sold their home to James Latsis. In 1945 his estate conveyed it by decree to his wife, Virginia Latsis. In 1945 Virginia Zambukos, "aka Latsis" sold it to John and Lucie Loomis.

James Latsis/Latses was born in Aglon, Greece in about 1892-95. He was the son of John and Marigo Martsoukos Latses. He immigrated to the United States in 1906 and married Virginia Karofotis. James died in 1944. A 1941 city directory confirms that the Greek couple resided in Butlerville that year, probably in this house.

On July 15, 1947, John and Lucie Loomis purchased this property from Virginia Zambukos and on the same day granted a mortgage of \$2,000 back to her. Then in 1953, the "Loomis" couple sold the house to Cecil and Aleen Carson. The Carsons kept it for nineteen years, selling it in 1972 to Crus Brothers Construction. A month later, the construction company sold it to Roy D. Holman. The property stayed in the Roy D. and LaRue Holman family until 1996 when it was sold to Susie-Jane and Kurt Woolley. In 2012 it became solely the property of Kurt W. Woolley, the present owner.

Given the age of the house, its periods of greatest historical significance appear to be the 1890s and 1937 through 1941 when it was built for one or both of the Colebrook families, pioneers of Butlerville, now part of Cottonwood Heights.



The last child of William, Jr. and Mary McGhie was Margaret, born in Butlerville in 1873. She was the second wife of Joseph Ira Staker, the brother of Nathan H. Staker. They moved to Idaho where she died in Teton in 1953.

#### OTHER 1870s RESIDENTS OF BUTLERVILLE

COVERT, William Spencer and Mary Courtwright, Ruth Chilson Chase Hutchings

The Coverts were among the earliest settlers of Butlerville. The family's patriarch was William Spencer Covert, a native of New York born in 1808. In about 1828 he married Mary Courtwright and they had ten children. Converted to Mormonism in 1844, they left Nauvoo and arrived in Utah in the fall of 1847, initially settling in the Holladay area. In 1853, William took a second wife, Ruth Chilson Chase Hutchings, who had a child, Emeline Jane, from an earlier marriage. From 1855 through 1858, the Coverts were part of the group colonizing Las Vegas. Like other Mormons recalled from the outlying settlements due to the incursion of Johnston's Army, the Coverts returned to the Salt Lake Valley in 1858, moving into the Butlerville area. Here seven of Ruth's nine children were born. As recorded in the 1870 census, William and three of his sons worked in the lumber mills in Big Cottonwood Canyon where the family spent its summers. William also operated the canyon's toll gate. An active LDS Church member, William helped construct the Granite/Butler Meetinghouse of 1886-1892.

Among the Covert children to stay in the area were William's stepdaughter, Emeline Jane Hutchings, who married Neri Butler, and sons Abner, Hyrum and Jacob. Jacob married Joann Blair, sister of Parley Blair, another Butlerville resident. Both of William's wives preceded him in death and he thereafter lived alone until 1899 when he died from severe burns received when his house burned down. His property was then obtained by the family of H.S. Jensen.

9-17-17 (or Ellie) MAXFIELD, John Ellison and Sarah Elizabeth Baker

For at least four generations, the Maxfields were important foundational families in the economy of Big Cottonwood Canyon and the development of Butlerville. The family was led by John Ellison Maxfield, born in Hull or Youlton, Yorkshire, England in 1801. In 1827 he married Sarah Elizabeth Baker, born in 1811 in Summerside, Prince Edward Island, Canada. Their children,

born between 1829 and about 1852, were Robert Quorton, married to Mary Jane Cahoon, Richard Dunwell, married to Ellen Diadema Thompson, Eliza Hiatt, Elijah Hiatt, married to Helen Ailcy Tanner, Jesse, James Appleton, married to Ann Clifton, William Wellner, married to Elizabeth Caldwell, John Ellis, married to Wilhelmina Marcussen Jensen, Sarah Elizabeth, married to George N. Stager, Joseph Smith, married to Matilda Ann Turpin, Quincy Benjamin, Henry Adheimer, married to Sarah Ellen Morrell, and Alice Renin.

The family arrived in Utah in 1851 and settled that year in the West Jordan area. John, Sr. was a superior woodman who got James and his brothers into the lumber business. Of John it was said, "He could evaluate a standing crop of timber, get it harvested, transport the logs to a mill, cut logs into lumber and the utilize the lumber for ship building."

John and his older sons worked for Brigham Young who sold them sawmills. They paid for them by supplying lumber for the Lion and Beehive Houses, Salt Lake Tabernacle and Theatre and several other buildings. Between them, John's sons came to own five sawmills. John's sons were all said to be "great horsemen." John and Elijah were wild horse breakers. Elijah spoke several Indian languages and served as "a spy in Johnston's Army in the Black Hills." He rode for the Pony Express, drove the stage coach back to and from Council Bluffs and was a freighter in the BY X (Brigham Young Express) Company. It was probably in this latter role that he "brought the first library to Utah." John's sons who were not lumbermen became farmers and one, James A., was listed in a census as a trader.

Because of their work in Big Cottonwood Canyon, some of the Maxfield children would move to and live in Butlerville. Among these was son James Appleton Maxfield.

MAXFIELD, James Appleton and Dorthe Sophia Marcussen Jensen (Johnson) and Ann Clifton

John's son James Maxfield, Sr. was born in 1837 on Prince Edward Island. In 1861 James married Dorthe Sophia Macussen Jensen, known as Sophia Johnson. She was born in Skorringe, Denmark in 1841 and died in 1870. Their four children, born from 1862 to 1868, were James Benjamin who married Amy Dunks, Emma Jane who married Arnold Edward Johnson, William A. who married Harriet Ann Smith, and Chauncey. After Sophia's death, James married Ann Clifton, born in London in 1849 to Robert and Mary Blanchard Clifton. The couple had nine children from 1875 to 1892: Hannah Rebecca, Esther Ann, Mary Elizabeth, Sophia Ellen ("Pearl") who married Samuel Albert Thomas, Sarah Edith, who married George Henry Baxter, Robert Montague who married Annie Ellen Ottley, Enos Clifton, Ira Arthur who married Mary Beatrice Baxter), and Henry who married Julia Leon Orton. Four of the earliest children died in infancy. James was Deputy Sheriff of Salt Lake County and owned the first meat market in Murray. He also owned a sawmill in Tooele and then was part owner of two in Big Cottonwood Canyon. Censuses list him as a "lumberman." Owning his own forge, anvils and bellows, his skill as a blacksmith was valued by teamsters for his ability to shoe horses and oxen and repair wagons.

John Maxfield, Sr., who died in 1875, worked on the Salt Lake Temple. James, Sr. and his brothers also hauled granite for the temple. James Maxfield died in 1903 and was buried in Murray. The family homestead was located in the northeast quarter of Section 27.

RITTER, William Christopher and Sarah Ann Lowry Ritter, Jenette Bland Ritter, Margarite Bailey

The Ritters were members of the LDS company of "Mississippi Saints" that headed west in 1846 and arrived in Utah on July 29, 1847 with the sick detachment of the Mormon Battalion. William C. Ritter was born in Marion, Alabama in 1824 to Anderson D. and Phoebe Douglas Young Ritter. In 1845 he married Sarah Ann Lowry of Kershaw, South Carolina. They had four children, William Taylor, Sarah Josephine, Phoebe Caroline and Martha Angeline. After William and Sarah Ann were divorced in 1859, he married Janette (or Janet, Jennette or Jeanette) Bland, born in 1832 in Johnstone, Scotland and the former wife of William Willard Hutchings. She brought into her new marriage her two children from the first: Jeanette (Nettie) and Robert, who took Ritter's last name and considered him their father. William and Jenette then had six children of their own: Charles, Kathleen ("Katie"), Adelia ("Delia"), William Christopher, Franklin ("Frank"), and Mary.

Upon entering the Salt Lake Valley, the Ritters settled in the Cottonwood area. Early on, William was employed as a logger. When mines were developed in Big Cottonwood Canyon in the 1860s, William became a miner there. While working in the Silver Fork area mines, he met a young "chore girl," Margaret Ann Bailey, and took her as his second, plural wife. She bore him a son, William Christopher, Jr. and continued to live up the canyon, an unhappy arrangement that resulted in divorce. In 1869 William, Jenette and family became some of the first settlers on the Butler Bench.

On January 16, 1875, an avalanche on the mountain above the Richmond Mine swept into the gulch below where William Ritter and other men were hauling ore on rawhide. The descent of the snow slide was so rapid that eight men were caught in its path and trapped under deep snow. Two miners were able to free themselves and they brought in men from other nearby mines to dig out the others, but Ritter was one of the six who died beneath the snow. He was buried in the Miners Cemetery at Silver Fork. Jenette sold off much of the family homestead but continued to live in Butler until her death in 1897.

Daughter Nettie Ritter was said to be the first school teacher in Butler commencing in 1877. She married Edward Newcomer in 1894 and the couple moved to the mining boomtown of Mercur, Utah. Upon his death in 1903, she returned to Butlerville where she died in 1936. Her brother, Robert, had passed on in 1883. Charles lived with his sister, Delia, and her husband, Mason Clays in Mercur during the early 1900s before moving to California. Katie married Joseph Harrington and moved to Oakland, California. Delia returned to Butler after her divorce from Mason Clays and died there in 1936. William, Jr. also lived in Mercur as a miner. After marrying Hannah

WRIGHT, John Diamond and Annie Elsie Jorgensen

John Wright was born in England in 1851 to Robert Richard and Emma Beeson Wright. At age 12 he arrived in Utah with his parents and three siblings in the mid-1860s. In 1875 John married Annie Elsie Jorgensen of Denmark. They were living in Butlerville by 1880. In 1900 he was a day laborer living in Salt Lake City, now with three children. In 1910 he was a stone mason and in 1920, a machinist's helper with the railroad. Clearly not a farmer, it is understandable that his employment opportunities were greater in the big city than in Butler. John Wright died in 1933.

## NEIGHBORHOODS WITHIN BUTLER

### COLEBROOK CORNER

Sometime after 1884, newly married Charles C. and Sarah McGhie Colebrook built the first house on the southwest corner of what became known as Colebrook Corner, located at the intersection of 20<sup>th</sup> East and 70<sup>th</sup> South (now Highland Drive and Ft. Union Blvd.). Here they and later ~~some of their children~~ <sup>sons</sup> among them, Lewis Colebrook) and grandchildren and their families built their homes, creating a small, family sub-neighborhood. Others in the area were the Buxton, Wiseman, Baker, Harris, Gates, Cullis, Millard and Hennekamp families. This area had earlier been a stopping place for stone haulers taking granite from Little Cottonwood Canyon to the Temple Block. It was later owned by the Baker family before becoming Colebrook Corner.

### FOUNDING FAMILY: THE COLEBROOKS

#### COLEBROOK, Charles C. and Sarah McGhie

In 1884 Charles C. Colebrook married Butler native Sarah McGhie, born in Provo in 1866. Their sole child was Lewis Charles (1885-1957), married to Lucy Brady (1887-1958). Charles was a railroad builder who helped construct four railroad lines in Utah, one in Wyoming and one in Montana. He served three years as a Jordan School District board member and for twelve years on the old 57<sup>th</sup> District School Board. Charles also worked as a constable and county road supervisor and as a founder and director of the Brown and Sanford Ditch Company. He was a farmer and active church man, functioning for six years as bishop of Butler Ward. Colebrook was still working his farm and milking cows at age 80. He died on July 15, 1943.

MAXFIELD, Joseph and Matilda Ann Turpin

One of the Maxfields to spend most of his life in Butler was Joseph Smith, born in 1847 in Bedeque, Prince Edward Island, Canada. Joseph was one of 14 children born to John Ellison and Sarah Elizabeth Maxfield. He arrived in Utah with his parents and siblings in 1851. Joseph was married in 1870 to Matilda Ann Turpin, born in 1853 at Jones Run, West Virginia. They had 13 children, five of whom died early, two of them from fatal accidents. Like his father and some of his brothers, Joseph had a sawmilling business, providing lumber for important construction projects in the Salt Lake City. He also maintained a farm and sawmill in the East Canyon area. For a time he left this line of work due to his employment in the paper mill. He also managed horses, cattle and sheep kept in the canyon during the summer for people in Salt Lake City. Joseph's family lived in the South Cottonwood and Butler areas until about 1912 when the Maxfields moved to Idaho where Joseph died in 1923, followed by Matilda in 1935.

STAKER, Nathan Henry and Mathilda Caroline Wagstaff

Nathan Staker was born in 1861 in Sugarhouse to William Henry and Catherine Maria Parsons Staker, Utah pioneers of 1852. He was one of the employees brought over from the old paper mill in Sugar House. At the time of the fatal fire of April 1, 1893, Staker was the new mill's foreman. In the fall of 1889, he and his mother bought some land on the Butler Bench. Nathan and his wife, Emeline, moved into a small log house there and his mother had a brick one constructed just west of her son's.

Nathan's daughter, Estelle Staker Bowthorpe, also employed at the mill, is one of the best sources for written descriptions of the mill and its operations. One of her accounts tells of how her father was injured trying to save the mill's paper:

"Father and others worked like demons to save what paper and books they could, but the roof soon fell in. Then father jumped into the 'pit' as they called it to save something. He stepped on a nail that went through his rubber boot into his foot. Every spring (thereafter) his foot would swell and become inflamed. Mother used to poultice

Florence Jane who married Samuel B. Mc Henry, and Annie Carol who married Lester Jennings Cardwell. After Emma died in 1915, Sant lived alone until about 1922 when he went to live with his daughter, Florence. Alexander McGhie died in 1940.

PANTER, William Joseph and Jane Gadsby Panter and Elizabeth Ann Walker

William J. Panter was born in 1861 in South Cottonwood, the son of Englishman William James and Jane Gadsby Panter, Utah pioneers of 1860. William the father applied for a homestead grant in 1869. He died in 1872 and his wife Jane received the grant in 1874. She later sold pieces of the property to others, including Samuel Webb. Her son, William Joseph, bought it back when Webb moved to Salt Lake City after 1921. Their other children were Emma, Sarah J., Annie, Mary C. and Sabaua.

The daughter of William Luke and Sarah Ann Chapple Walker, Elizabeth Ann Walker was born in 1866 in Salt Lake City. Elizabeth and William married in 1885, resided in Union and adopted two daughters, Eva and Ethel.

In 1893 Panter purchased from Samuel Webb a part of Section 21 in the northernmost part of Union and commenced farming after previously working as a stock herder. To get water to his land, he joined others in digging irrigation ditches. Panter was the first president of the Brown & Sanford Ditch (or Irrigation) Company. The company was incorporated in 1900. As implied by its name, the company's object was to develop and use the waters of their ditch, a branch of Big Cottonwood Creek, for irrigation purposes. Panter was also a director of the Murray State Bank and a Republican member of the Utah House of Representatives from 1904-06. He died in 1916 at age 55. Elizabeth passed on in 1930.

SANFORD, William M.

William Sanford was a partner in the Brown-Tanner Ditch Company. This company was the leading builder of irrigation canals and ditches in the Butler area, taking water out of Big Cottonwood Canyon after the Morse Decree was issued. Their three major ditches were the two forks and a branch of the Brown & Sanford Ditch, each running east-to-west from the canyon across the Butler Bench and beyond. These ditches and their small north-to-south lateral ditches made farming viable throughout the upper Butler and Poverty Flats areas.

In 1878 Sanford homesteaded 160 acres located on both sides of Bengal Boulevard between 23<sup>rd</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> East. He lived there for a short time before disappearing, "being driven out by his wife" who filed for divorce in 1890. While there, he farmed his land which benefitted from one of his irrigation ditches. He sold parcels of land to the Bowthorpes and Joseph Maxfield families.

## HISTORY QUESTION OF THE MONTH

What Cottonwood Heights resident owned and operated the "Black Rock Resort"?

### ANSWER

James John Latses was born in Ageon Vaseleon, Greece June 2, 1892. He emigrated to America October 6, 1906, arriving on the ship "Caroline" at New York, New York. He moved to Utah that same year. He was naturalized March 31, 1914. He was a veteran of World War I, enlisting in the infantry on June 15, 1918. He was honorably discharged Dec 17, 1918. He and his wife, Virginia, moved to Cottonwood Heights about 1932. Mr. Latses was a Salt Lake real estate man. He opened the resort at Black Rock Beach on the south shore of the Great Salt Lake in 1934 and operated it until his death February 5, 1944. He was a member of the Greek-American Progressive Association, the American Legion, the Arcadian Greek Organization, Kolokotronis Lodge, the Salt Lake City Chamber of Commerce and was former trustee of the Greek Orthodox Church and former president of the Salt Lake Greek Community. His wife Virginia remained in the area after his death.

house supported by stables, corrals and his orchard. Between 1889 and 1895, Johnson sold parcels of his land to newcomers Joseph Newman, August Hauptfleisch, Joseph Biesinger, Edward Koelliker and Chris Hemmert.

Johnson then made the ill-fated decision to become a coal miner. On May 1, 1900, there was an explosion in the Winter Quarters Mine in which he labored. Johnson was one of more than 200 men killed in the greatest disaster in Utah mining history. He left behind his widow and their seven children. By then, they had moved her family to Salt Lake City.

August Steingruber bought the Newman homestead and farmed it until at least 1903, after which they too moved, selling their farm to James and Maggie Thompson. (Move this to right place.)

The Newmans were living in Danish Town by about 1890 when they bought part of the farm of Christen Johnson, their neighbor in Big Cottonwood. Joseph was a farmer born in 1845 in England. His family converted to the LDS Church in 1850 and in 1853 he came to Utah as a child with his parents, Joseph Moses and Eliza Spencer Newman. They settled in Big Cottonwood. His wife, Elizabeth Ann Moses, was born in 1850, in Kanessville, Iowa during the trek west. They were married in 1876. Their nine children were Joseph Samuel, Martha Edith, Joseph Moses, John Spencer, Ann Elizabeth, Frank William, Fredrick Partridge, Eliza, and Adelaide.


Sometime before 1892 he moved his family to Salt Lake City and in about 1895, he sold the remainder of his Danish Town farm land to August Hauptfleisch. The family then moved to Holladay. Elizabeth passed away in 1902, leaving Joseph a widower with several children. He died in 1922 and was buried in Holladay.



Sometime after 1903, George and Alice Teasdale purchased the Hauptfleisch place. They in turn sold it to William and Florence Pepper in about 1915. Other families living in Danish Town for a short time in around 1900 were the families Benjamin and Eva Heap, August and Fredricka Dittman, H.S. Jensen, J. Cornwall and later, the Vesley and Hilpert families.

During the 1890s the five colonist families remaining in Danish Town, along with the two settlers living along Wasatch Boulevard and four who owned land north of Danish Town, dug a ditch from the mouth of Little Willow Canyon (now called Deaf Smith Canyon), diverting the waters of Little Willow Creek






