## Everyone Can Be In-the-Know on City Issues

*"A properly functioning democracy depends on an informed electorate."*

These wise words written more than 200 years ago by Founding Father Thomas Jefferson are perhaps even more important today. In his day, of course, President Jefferson was concerned that citizens take the time to seek out information and educate themselves. The challenge was much different then. The quantity of books and other information was limited compared to today's world where we find ourselves overloaded with vast amounts of information that is literally at our fingertips.

In this information age, we are bombarded by the equivalent of 174 newspapers of data a day, according to a recent study by the University of Southern California. We receive five times more information every day than we did 30 years ago, and we each have the equivalent of 600,000 books stored electronically. Comparatively, people living 100 years ago were lucky to read the equivalent of 50 books in a lifetime.

Sorting through and analyzing the value of that information is likely what makes it hardest for us to stay informed now. It is a matter of quantity vs. quality. But the importance of the objective to stay informed, as well as the outcome of a better society, remain the same. That's especially true when it comes to community issues. Only by knowing what is going on around us are we able to make certain that our communities are functioning as we want them to. Armed with information, we are also able to bring

about change and improvement if we deem that necessary.

Along those lines, I am frequently asked how citizens can know what is happening in the city or how they can be informed. Fortunately, because access to information is so readily available, it has never been easier to be in-the-know about city issues. Finding out what is going on is not exclusive to a privy few. We all can tap into the important information about the happenings of Cottonwood Heights.

Becoming informed doesn't have to take much time (unless one wants to dig deeper into certain topics) and there are plenty of ways to gather information and interact directly on community matters. As for the City Council and me, as Mayor, we welcome an informed electorate. We know that the vibrancy of our city depends on the involvement of its residents and each of us as neighbors. It's up to all of us to become informed so we can ensure our city is the best it can be. There are multiple ways to do that, such as:

1. Sign up to automatically receive copies of agendas from the City Council, Planning Commission or other committees. You can subscribe on the city's website at [cottonwoodheights.utah.gov/newsletter/](http://cottonwoodheights.utah.gov/newsletter/). Get email alerts for meetings and other notices. You can select the categories of interest, ranging from council agendas to notice of road projects, community events or employment opportunities. You don't have to miss out on anything. You can also subscribe to receive an electronic PDF version of the city's monthly published newsletter.

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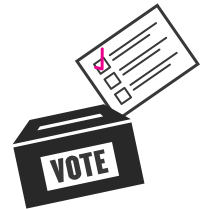

Our production team wanted to use everyone, however, there were only so many parts to fill.

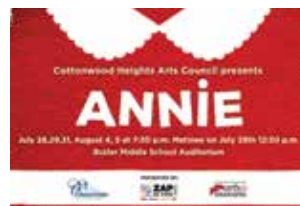
We are excited about the wonderfully talented cast. This will be a great show, and you

2. Listen to the City Council and other city meetings over the internet. If you are unable to physically attend a meeting, you can listen to live streaming audio at <http://mixlr.com/chmeetings/>. This is a great way to be informed if you are out of town or otherwise unable to be there in person. You can also listen to past meetings.
3. Read the city newsletter each month. There is all kinds of information there about city issues and events. The newsletter also contains monthly columns by several city officials, including elected officers and representatives of the police and fire departments, as well as spotlights about Cottonwood Heights businesses. It's mailed each month or find it on the city's website.
4. Follow the Twitter feeds of the city at [twitter.com/CHCity](https://twitter.com/CHCity) or Cottonwood Heights Police Department at [twitter.com/CHPolice](https://twitter.com/CHPolice). You can also sign up for text alerts from the city Twitter feed, by going to [twitter.com/settings/devices](https://twitter.com/settings/devices) and entering your mobile phone number. This is a good way to get instant updates and news about the city.
5. Follow the city's Facebook Page at [facebook.com/CHCITY](https://facebook.com/CHCITY). This is a great place to get answers, address concerns and receive information about immediate issues, such as weather incidents and special events. The city also maintains a Facebook page for the Arts Council and Butlerville Days. Citizens are always welcome to express comments and concerns while engaging with friends and neighbors on a variety of subjects. The page is monitored and a city representative will always answer your queries.
6. Attend a City Council meeting held the second and fourth Tuesday or attend a City Council work session any Tuesday other than a fifth Tuesday. Meetings are held at City Hall, 2277 E. Bengal Blvd.
7. Email your elected representative with questions or concerns. 10. Volunteer to be on a city committee or group. Cottonwood Heights depends on volunteers and you'll have an inside track to the workings of the city. Find out more information here: [cottonwoodheights.utah.gov/community/volunteer](http://cottonwoodheights.utah.gov/community/volunteer)

By becoming informed, citizens truly can make a difference in our community. I would even go so far as to say that the very fabric of our city is the result of an informed electorate. ## Road Construction Updates

### Ft. Union Blvd. Sewer Line:

A sewer line replacement project will continue through most of the summer on Fort Union Boulevard between 3000 East and Wasatch Boulevard. Expect delays as the road will shift to one lane on a regular basis.

### Wasatch Blvd. "High T" Intersection:

UDOT will install a new "High T" intersection at the LaCaille turnoff on Wasatch

Bldv. this summer and into early autumn. Expect delays as crews work to improve traffic flow in the area. Part of the intersection will be closed in late August or early September.

### Fort Union/Highland Intersection Widening:

Rocky Mountain Power has completed placement of new power poles to make room for extra lanes at the Fort Union / Highland Dr.

intersection. Crews will continue to move power lines before construction begins in Spring 2018.

### 9400 South Closure:

Beginning in July, 9400 South (in Sandy) will close for a few nights, so crews can install a new bridge. The closure will affect commuters who travel through Cottonwood Heights.

## We All Live Downstream: Stormwater Guidelines

Storm water runoff is precipitation from rain and snowmelt that flows over the ground. As it flows, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and deposit them in to a storm drain system or body of water.

Anything that enters a storm drain system is discharged (untreated) in to the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

To keep the storm water clean, follow these simple guidelines:

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. Brush or blow away any excess back onto landscaped areas;
- Repair auto leaks;
- Clean up after your pet;
- Dispose of household hazardous waste, used auto fluids (antifreeze, oil, etc..) and batteries at designated locations;
- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface;
- Sweep up yard debris rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible;
- Clean Latex paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors. Clean-oil based paint brushes in a container and dispose of solvent as household hazardous waste;
- Sweep up and properly dispose of construction debris like concrete and mortar.

## Citizens Police Academy a Great Success

Twenty-five devoted residents got a first-hand look at law enforcement during a Citizens Academy, held by the Cottonwood Heights Police Department. It was the second year of the program, and the CHPD looks forward to holding another academy next year.

Classes were held on Wednesday evenings during an eight-week program in March and April, consisting of interactive classes at City Hall and at various field locations.

Students were exposed to various aspects of law enforcement. Participants were able to experience "use of force" situations inside 340-degree simulator, live SWAT demonstrations, and a K-9 demo, including a "bite suit."



The academy also included an overview of patrol, a jail tour, a 9-1-1 dispatch center tour, youth programs overview, traffic law enforcement classes, a recruiting/training program, community awareness training and victim advocacy discussions, including domestic violence awareness and an understanding of special victims (elderly and at-risk adults).

Graduates were also encouraged to join CH Get Ready (emergency preparedness volunteers) and the CHPD Neighborhood Watch program.

More importantly, the program offered an opportunity for continued law enforcement education, while allowing participants to have an interactive association with the police department as volunteers.

"It allows the community to engage with the police department and have an open dialogue," said Assistant Chief Paul Brenneman.

Academy graduates expressed gratitude for

the program and recommended it to anyone who qualifies (an application and background check were required to join).

A graduation ceremony and dinner were held on April 26 at City Hall. Mayor Cullimore, Chief Robby Russo and Assistant Chief Brenneman were there to hand out certificates and share a few thoughts

on the importance of citizen involvement in law enforcement and public safety. Officer Jeff Potter, one of the course instructors also spoke about the importance of community involvement and understanding police work.

The courses were taught by Officer Potter, Officer Sara Widman and Sgt. Chris McHugh. ■



## CH Shakeout 2017 a Grand Community Effort

Several city staff members, city partners and residents participated in the Cottonwood Heights "ShakeOut 2017" on Saturday, April 22.

The year's event was centered around more than emergency preparedness in an earthquake; it was also about being prepared for other catastrophes like flooding.

A lot of people pitched in to report during the drill, and some families, including kids, really "dug in" and filled a LOT of sandbags. Many families stopped by the Cottonwood

Heights Recreation Center to fill more than 1,000 sandbags, to be used in case of flooding.

A big thanks to the Cottonwood Heights Recreation Center for the use of their facilities, the Utah Region Red Cross volunteers for



the simulated shelter, to the CH Amateur Radio Club for all the communications, the Unified Fire Authority (Station 116) for their assistance (they probably filled the most sandbags, too), missionaries from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and all the CH Police & Public Works staff for their help to make this a successful exercise. ■



## Summer Safety Reminder

All summer long, people are outdoors working on projects like lawn care, hosting barbecues or relaxing by a pool. It can be easy to forget to close a door or window, but if they are left open it creates an easy opportunity for a burglar. Garage doors, in particular, are regularly used by criminals to gain access to a home during the warmer months. People go outside to do yardwork and forget to close the garage door. Criminals may steal items from the garage itself, which usually contains tools and other valuable belongings, or use it as an easy way to get into your home. Once inside, an intruder can grab an

armful of things quickly, and run off without ever being noticed.

Some criminals will work together during the summer months. One will come to your door and distract you, while the other sneaks into your garage, backyard or home to take whatever they can grab. Be wary of anyone who approaches your front door and don't let them take up too much of your time. Every year, thousands of burglaries occur all over the United States. Teach your family how to guard themselves and their property and do what you can to ensure a safe and happy summer for everyone. ■

The Walter Lorenzo Berrett family grew a huge crop of watermelons each summer. Trying to get rid of them became a problem. While Mr. Berrett didn't believe in working on the Sabbath, he did sell watermelons on Sundays. The family lived off of 70th South and east of 1300 East. Because there was a lot of traffic on 70th South on Sunday (maybe 10 cars) with people going up 7000 South to get to the Canyon, he decided this would be a good way to get rid of his crop. On Saturday night

Mr. Berrett, along with his children would go down to the watermelon fields with a makeshift cart that they heaped with watermelons to take to their yard. After church services on Sunday morning, Mr. Berrett would pull the load of watermelons up to 70th South and park it there. The children would then sit there and sell watermelons to those passing by. The big watermelons went for 25 cents and the small ones for 10 cents. Of course, no one would buy one without first plugging it, by cutting a little square into the melon and pulling out a sample to taste it. If it was green they wouldn't buy it, and those melons were given to the pigs to eat. ■

In September 2016, Cottonwood Heights was recognized as a Business-Friendly Community as part of the Governor's Utah Business Friendly Cities Initiative. ■



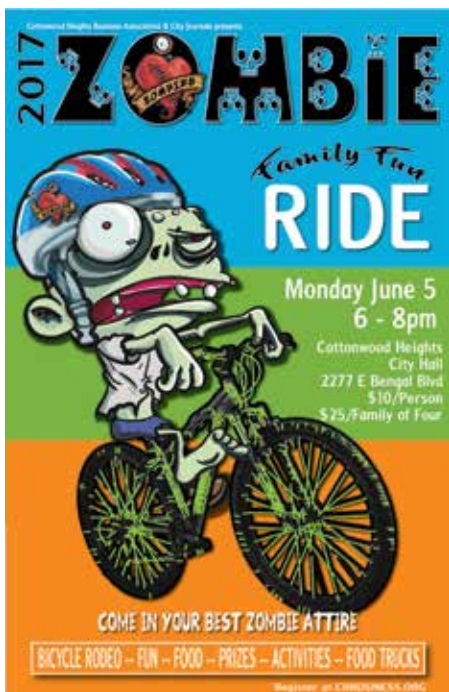
