

was a significant achievement, culminating in the successful passage of the General Obligation bond by our residents. Your support demonstrates the community's enthusiasm for creating a vibrant gathering space. We'll keep you updated as this project progresses in 2025.

- **General Plan Update:** Cottonwood Heights' General Plan serves as a guide for our city's future. Thanks to additional grant funding, we've made great strides in beginning to update several key elements of the plan to reflect our community's evolving needs.
- **Mountview Park Pollinator Garden:** Phase one of the garden was completed in partnership with Mott's Landscaping. Adding to this, local artist Whitney Horrocks and Draper Fabrication collaborated with our Arts Council to create a stunning mural that complements this beautiful addition to the park.
- **Traffic Safety Enhancements:** The Cottonwood Heights Police Department established a new four-member traffic safety team to focus on enforcement and reducing road-related incidents, ensuring safer streets for everyone.
- **K-9 Team Expansion:** Thanks to a generous donation, our Police Department was able to

add a replacement K-9 to its team.

All four K-9 units are now certified in drug detection and apprehension, further enhancing community safety.

- **Capital Projects:** Our Public Works team completed several critical infrastructure projects, including updates to stormwater systems (Pepper Hill Storm Drain Project and Cory Hill Circle waterway) and pedestrian safety improvements (raised crosswalk near Bywater Park and a HAWK signal near Bella Vista Elementary).
- **Community Events:** The Arts Council hosted 23 events in 2024, including Butlerville Days, Bark in the Park, and the acclaimed musical *Beauty and the Beast*. Together with events organized by other departments, these activities created abundant opportunities for community



engagement and connection.

While there are many more achievements to celebrate, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to all who contributed to making 2024 a remarkable year. From the inspired leadership of our mayor and city council to the tireless dedication of our staff and the countless volunteer hours from residents, your efforts have truly made a difference.

Here's to building on this momentum and making 2025 an even greater year for Cottonwood Heights! ■

## Short Term Rental Policy Updates

Cottonwood Heights has assembled a committee of staff, citizens, and council to review its current policies regarding short-term rentals. The committee's goals are to research how short-term rentals impact housing availability, to preserve the long-term residential character of our city's neighborhoods by addressing nuisances and disruptions, and to improve compliance with licensing and tax remittance requirements.

Cities surrounding Cottonwood Heights are revisiting their ordinances and policies too. For example, Murray City recently approved hosted sharing which is a short-term rental of part of an owner's primary residence while the owner lives on-site throughout the visitors' stay. Sandy City's planning commission and council are reviewing short-term rental ordinances for improvements and increased compliance.

There are pros and cons to allowing short-term rentals in our community. People want to visit and relocate in the Salt Lake Valley because of the year-round mountain recreational activities surrounded by the conveniences of city life. This increased demand can't be ignored or stopped, but we can implement policies to manage the influx in a way that preserves and enhances the suburban mountain lifestyle current residents know and enjoy in Cottonwood Heights.

The city council, mayor, and committee want your input. A short-term rental town hall is scheduled on February 25, 2025, at 6:00 PM at city hall. There will be a brief presentation of current city and state policies, enforcement challenges, and the committee's findings and initial thoughts on revisions. The floor will then be open for citizen comments in an engaged dialogue with staff and council. ## Winter fire hydrant maintenance: Help firefighters in case of home emergencies

Maintaining a clear and workable space around fire hydrants during the winter months is critical. In general, this responsibility falls on the residents who own or occupy property nearest a hydrant.

Snow accumulation can quickly obstruct fire hydrants and block access from fire department vehicles. We all think about shoveling our driveways and front steps, and making sure there is a clear means of escape during and after a snowstorm is very important, too! However, we can't neglect our responsibility to ensure the fire department has the necessary access to water supply should they need to respond to a fire.

When responding to structure fires, time is of the essence. This short clip (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=uDV2vw8T1IY>) demonstrates the difference snow near a hydrant can have on time. If you have a hydrant on or near your property, here are

the things you can do to ensure firefighters can connect to the hydrant when needed:

- Shovel or snow blow three feet of space on each side and in the back of fire hydrants.
- Maintain an open corridor from the street to the front of fire hydrants.
- These clearings should go all the way to the ground whenever possible, but not less than one foot below the hydrant caps at a minimum.

Some neighborhoods organize an Adopt-A-Hydrant program. This creates the awareness for residents to take note of clearing snow from hydrants and maintaining space around them and to help each other with those tasks throughout the



winter months. These things can be done when you are already out shoveling or snow blowing your driveways and sidewalks. Also, if you ever notice any issue that may require maintenance, please notify the city.

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## Get Involved: Sign Up for the Cottonwood Heights Police Department's Citizens Academy!

The Cottonwood Heights Police Department is excited to announce the return of its Citizens Academy classes, starting on February 26, 2025. This engaging program is designed to give residents, business owners, and employees of Cottonwood Heights a unique opportunity to gain insight into the workings of their local police department and to foster a stronger community relationship.

Participants in the Citizens Academy will have the chance to interact with CHPD officers and learn about various aspects of law enforcement through a series of informative classes. Some highlights of the curriculum include:

- **Lethal Force/Firearm Simulator:** Get an introduction to the rules governing an officer's use of force, along with an overview of weapon systems. Participants will engage in simulated scenarios to understand the critical decisions officers must make in real-life situations.
- **Valley Emergency Communications Center (VECC) Tour:** Take a behind-the-

scenes look at the VECC, which provides essential police and fire dispatch services for Cottonwood Heights.

- **Criminal Investigation and Evidence Collection:** This hands-on segment will introduce participants to the fundamentals of crime investigation, allowing them to experience evidence collection firsthand
- **Gangs and Narcotics:** Hear from gang and narcotics enforcement investigators who will share insights about local investigations and the challenges faced by law enforcement.
- **Domestic Violence and K9s:** Learn about domestic violence investigations from investigators and the department's victim advocate, and meet the K9 officers and their handlers.
- **Traffic Enforcement:** Discover the tactics police officers use to enforce traffic laws and investigate violations, along with an overview of their roles within the department.
- **SWAT Teams:** Meet the SWAT team and



gain an understanding of their specialized equipment and operations.

Classes commence on February 26, and although participants are encouraged to attend all sessions, missing one or two will not prevent them from graduating from the Citizens Academy.

## Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District: Achieving the 2024 Diversion Rate Goal of 18%


With your help we achieved our District-wide 2024 Diversion Rate Goal of 18%!

The District's diversion rate is the percentage of residential municipal waste diverted from the landfill through reuse, reduction, recycling, and composting programs.

The Trans-Jordan Landfill is predicted to reach capacity in 8 years, while the Salt Lake Valley Landfill is set to reach capacity in about 40 years. After these landfills fill up, trash will need to be transported out of the valley, increasing vehicles on the

road, emissions and transportation costs. Diverting from the landfill supports the longevity of the landfills and reduces our carbon footprint. WFWRD offers multiple diversion opportunities including recycling, glass recycling, and subscription weekly curbside green waste collection.

## Loving our Parks in the Winter

From the Captains of the Volunteers in the Parks and the Parks, Trails, and Open Space Committee and the Cottonwood Heights Parks and Recreation Department

Our Parks are loved year-round. During the snow and ice season, visitation and maintenance doesn't stop.

The walking paths at Mountview, Golden Hills, Ferguson, and Mill Hollow Parks, along with the Big Cottonwood Trail, Mill Hollow Corporate Trail, and East Jordan Canal Trail, are typically plowed after other priority areas—such as the Recreation Center, City Hall and other sidewalks—are cleared and deemed safe. The goal is to make these paths accessible as soon as possible,

The sidewalk below the sledding hill at Mountview Park is not cleared

to allow for a longer slope and great sledding.

Mountview Park and Ferguson Park are the only two parks with restrooms open year-round. The restrooms are locked at night.

Ice melt is only applied to building entrances. It is not used on park paths, sidewalks or trails.

The lights at Antczak Park tennis courts and the Rec Center Pickleball Courts are on from 5 pm to 8 pm.

way it is today, including its early leadership, its urban development priorities, law enforcement, and public utilities.


**In these interviews, the first two mayors address these questions and items:**

## SUSTAINABILITY

### A La Niña Winter

As you may have heard, the 2024-2025 winter has brought back a La Niña weather pattern to the Pacific Ocean. La Niña is a climate pattern marked by cooler-than-average sea surface temperatures in the central and eastern Pacific Ocean, which often influences weather across the United States, including here in Utah. This can have a major impact on snowfalls.

For Northern Utah's water, La Niña winters typically bring challenges and variability. In some years, La Niña leads to above-average snowfall in the Wasatch Mountains, boosting snowpack, while in others, precipitation falls short of expectations. Southern Utah often experiences drier conditions, which can contribute to ongoing drought concerns statewide, as much of Northern Utah's water comes from all over the state.

So far, the 2024–2025 winter season has

seen mixed results. A series of storms in late December and early January improved Utah's snowpack to near-normal levels for this time of year. This is encouraging! Snowpack provides the majority of Utah's water supply when it melts in the spring. However, Southern Utah remains drier, and only recently received rain in late January after a dry spell lasting from November 2024. This highlights the uneven impact of La Niña across the state.

For Cottonwood Heights residents, the variable nature of La Niña underscores the importance of water conservation. Even with recent snowfall, longer-term drought concerns persist, making it essential to use water wisely. Let's work together to ensure that Utah's water resources are managed sustainably while continuing to enjoy the beauty of winter in our community. ■


