Be Heard: Take the New Guiding Our Growth Survey

Preserving Utah’s unique quality of life requires carefully weighing the impacts of potential decisions about housing, open space, water, transportation, and more. This new survey leads participants through zip-code-specific options for dealing with growth challenges. The answers aren’t easy, but the best solutions require collaboration and facing the toughest decisions head-on.

Utah leaders statewide are listening, and invite the public to share their opinions about how to guide Utah’s growth. The survey will extend through the end of August. Results will direct the “big moves” required in the near future to ensure the best Utah possible for future generations. Take the time to be heard. ■



Matt Holton Selected to Fill the Vacant City Council Seat



After an in-depth selection process involving 13 applicants, on May 16th the Cottonwood Heights City Council selected Matt Holton to fill the District 1 City Council seat that became vacant after the recent death of Doug Petersen. “I feel honored to have this opportunity to serve as a City Councilmember in Cottonwood Heights and look forward to the opportunity to contribute to my community and connect with my neighbors” said Holton.

The process to fill a vacant City Council seat is defined in state code and included the following steps:

- **Notice:** A notice was posted for two weeks advertising for qualified candidates (registered voter, resident of District 1) to fill the vacancy.
- **Application:** After the application deadline ended, a list of applicants was posted through City communication channels and all the application information was forwarded to the City Council.
- **Interviews:** The City Council held a special meeting on Monday, May 15th to interview candidates. Because it was a public meeting, all candidates were allowed to be in the room during the interview process. There was a random selection process to determine the order of the responses to ensure fairness.
- **Ballots:** After all the interviews were conducted, the City Council held a second special business meeting on Tuesday, May 16th. Each

councilmember was given a written ballot showing all the candidates’ names in the randomized manner suggested by the Lt. Governor’s office. Each councilmember voted for one of the candidates on the ballot.

- **Voting:** Marked ballots were submitted to the city recorder for tabulation in view of the City Council and public.
- **Tie-Breaking:** There were well defined tie-breaking procedures established if there was a need, but the City Council voted 3 to 1 to have Matt Holden fill the seat. Therefore, a tie breaking procedure was not necessary.

Councilmember Holton was sworn in by the city recorder at the May 16th business meeting and was immediately seated as the new District 1 Councilmember. He will complete Councilmember Petersen’s term that will end at the first of next year.

Matt has broad experience working with all levels of local, state and federal government as well as with businesses such as Rio Tinto Kennecott. He and his wife Katie have two children with one more on the way.

Matt is excited to be part of the City Council, stating “It is a privilege to be representing District 1 as a City Councilmember. I look forward to meeting and interacting with residents and business owners in District 1 to ensure that we maintain a vibrant community and our quality of life.” ■

Be prepared to evacuate if wildfires threaten your neighborhood this summer

Though Cottonwood Heights is an urban community, its Wasatch Front location puts several neighborhoods along the wildland-urban interface, areas adjacent to undeveloped land with vegetation and potential wildfire risks. These risks vary in severity depending on the neighboring fuel, lay of the land and any type of area wildlife management.

Residents are responsible for mitigating wildfire risk on their own properties. Here are several preparation tips from the Ready, Set, Go! website (wildlandfirersg.org):

- **Be ready.** Create and maintain defensible space around your home and property. This includes removing

flammable vegetation within 30 feet of your home and extending outward from there with other protective measures. If your home borders public land, work with the City and fire department to address your concerns.

- **Get set.** Ensure your family is prepared to evacuate on short notice. This includes having important valuables, documentation, medicine and other essential items ready for a quick retreat.
- **Be ready to go.** When wildfire strikes and you're concerned for your safety, leave the area before safety officials tell you too. Public safety authorities will do their best to evacuate areas when necessary, but we also rely on residents to act on their own if they feel threatened by fire.

Now is a great time to begin assessing your readiness for the wildfire season. Whether you're collecting needed items in case of an evacuation or planning for a property risk assessment, it is never too early to prepare for the wildfire



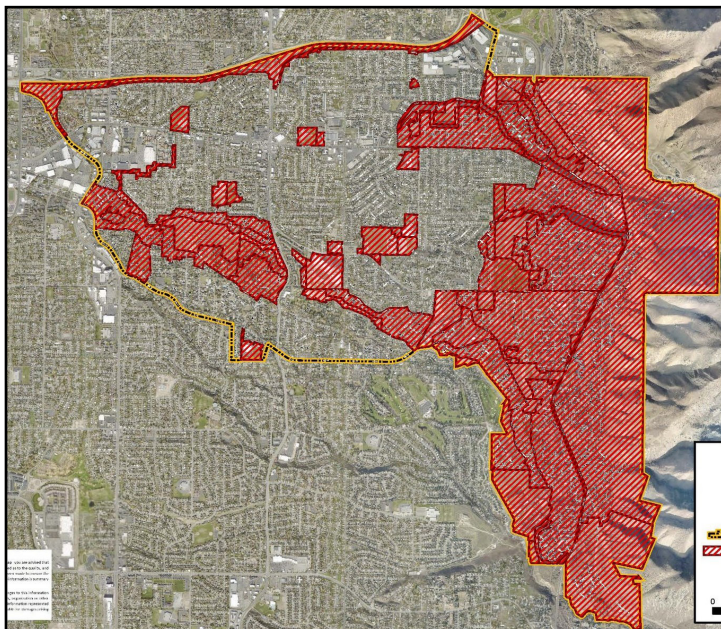
season.

Fireworks are legal **ONLY** in areas not designated as restricted and between 11 a.m. and 11 p.m. on July 2-5 and July 22-25 (the firework discharge time is extended to midnight on July 4 and July 24). 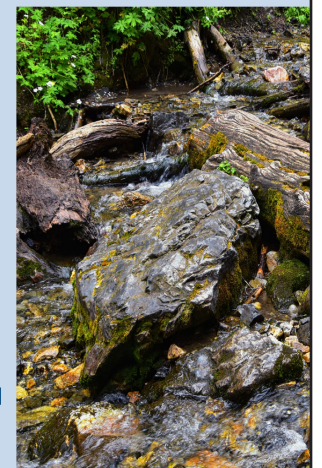


Stay Informed and Keep Your Family Safe During Flooding

Staying informed is crucial to ensuring your family's safety during flooding. To stay up-to-date, follow local news and weather updates. For city-specific information, you can visit ch.utah.gov/floods. ■

Prepare now for potential spring flooding

- Be cautious and aware of your surroundings, stay safe and avoid entering waterways when water levels rise. Keep children and pets away from areas with high water. Your safety is our top priority.
- Check stormwater inlet grates near your home and remove any debris
- Pull debris from the stream or creek adjacent to your property *before* stream levels rise (do **not** enter the water when flows are high)
- Pile **ONLY** stream debris (not household items or yard waste) in the street near your home and call the public works team at 801-944-7000 to remove it

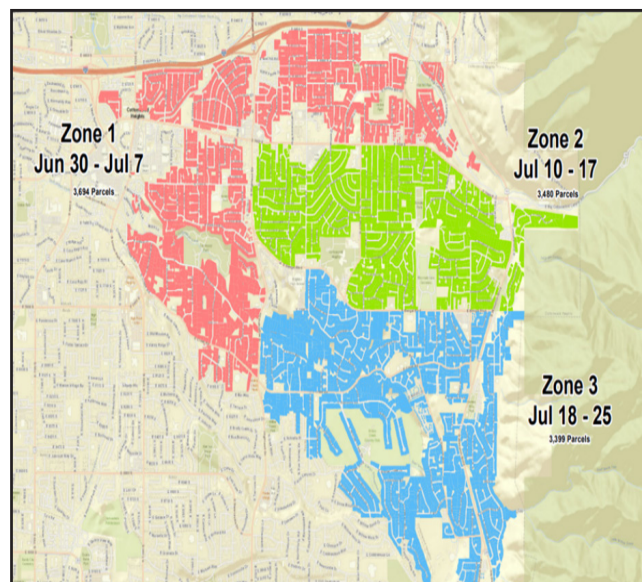
Seasonal Container Reservation Program (SCRP)

The Seasonal Container Reservation Program (SCRP) is officially underway! Set your reminders! Reservations are open online for containers on the dates below:

- **Zone 1 Reservations Open:** June 16th
Containers Available: June 30 - July 7.
- **Zone 2 Reservations Open:** June 26th
Containers Available: July 10 - 17.
- **Zone 3 Reservations Open:** July 3rd
Containers Available: July 18 - 25.

Containers will be dropped off sometime between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the scheduled day. Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District staff will try to ensure that residents have up to 24 hours with the container. Driveways must be cleared, accessible, and have enough room (approximately 10' x 20') for the container

to be placed off the street and public sidewalk. If the driveway is inaccessible, the container will not be delivered, and you will lose your opportunity for the container at your residence. Please visit our website to see what is and isn't allowed in the containers. Can't find your zone on the map? Head to the "Do We Service You?" tab on our website. Search for your address and your SCRCP dates will be listed. ■



Two New City Parks Are Coming Soon!

The City is thrilled to announce that it is constructing two new parks for residents to enjoy. In a city that has been mostly developed since its incorporation, the addition of new parks and open spaces is a welcome development. Here are some details about each of the parks:

Ferguson Park: When complete, Ferguson Park will be the first off-leash dog park in the city. It is located just off Wasatch Boulevard, at 7725 South Wasatch Boulevard. With the actual park portion substantially completed, construction is now underway on a parking lot that will serve both Ferguson Park and hikers of Ferguson Canyon above. This project was made possible by community interest and donations for park amenities (benches, picnic tables, drinking fountains, etc.), previous land purchase by Salt Lake County, and grant funding that has greatly



subsidized construction costs to the city.

Completion of the parking area is anticipated in the next 90 days, and the city hopes to have the park open to the public later this summer.

Doverhill Drive Public Park: The city has been working for several years to purchase and develop a new public park at 3625 East Doverhill Drive. This six-acre parcel has historically been home to a meetinghouse building owned by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. When the property was advertised for sale on the private development market, the city immediately began working with church

officials to retain a portion of the land for a public park.

Through ongoing meetings and work with church representatives and engagement by nearby city residents, the City has agreed to purchase and retain two acres of the property for use as a public park. The remaining four acres will be developed by Ivory Homes as a single-family residential subdivision.

The City expects to complete the purchase of the property soon and anticipates that the park will be substantially completed within the next 24 months. ■



Learn more about the history of Granite Power Plant

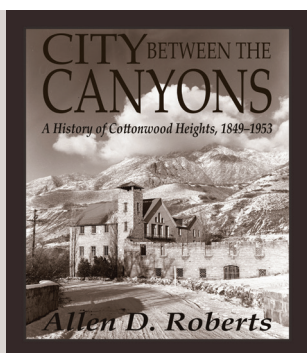
The Granite Power Plant was constructed between 1896-1897 by Utah Power, which was owned by the Salt Lake Railroad Company. This hydroelectric power station was located at the mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon and was built to power streetcars in downtown Salt Lake City. Despite its intended purpose, the station experienced frequent outages and was sold several times, eventually ending up in the hands of Utah Light and Power, one of the major power suppliers. Utah Light and Power later became Utah Power and Light, then Utah Power, and finally, Rocky Mountain Power, which is now part of PacifiCorp.

The Granite Power Plant consists of a powerhouse, a transformer house, a wooden conduit, penstocks, and a small dam, but the dam is not considered part of the Historic District. An operator's house was also built nearby and is not part of the Historic District. On April 20, 1989, the plant was added to the National Register as being in Salt Lake County.

When Utah Light and Power purchased the plant, they also acquired four homes near the Old Mill that had previously



housed mill workers. These homes were repurposed to house workers at the power plant, with several men from the Cottonwood Heights area employed there in the early 1900s. ■
