Spring Forward to Safety: Tips for Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detector Maintenance

With the passing of Daylight Saving Time, this is a great opportunity to test and check the operability of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in our homes and ensure they are

installed correctly.

The American Red Cross suggests that detectors are placed on every level of your home. They should be placed within each bedroom or directly outside the door. Combination smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are recommended in areas where people may be sleeping.



Testing detectors is as simple as pressing the button on the device until you hear it activate. Also, while testing, lightly dust or vacuum detectors to ensure they are free of any debris that could interfere with proper operation.

It is recommended that detectors older than 10 years old be replaced with newer models. Many detectors will have an expiration date printed near the battery compartment or plug if they are hard-wired into the home. If your detectors have expired or you don't know the date (and they are older), it is best to replace them as soon as possible.

This is also a great time to develop and practice fire escape plans for your home. Those in your home need to know what to do in the event of a fire within the house. Occupants should have at least two ways out of each

room and the necessary tools to escape, such as window well ladders in basement rooms. A designated meeting point outside and away from the home should be identified so everyone knows where to meet. It is essential to remind everyone, once outside, not to reenter the house for any reason, as conditions can be hazardous. If you have a plan, remind everyone of what it is and be sure it is still what's best for your family.

Working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are a critical component of home safety and have saved a significant number of lives. The approach of spring is a great time to ensure that you and your family are prepared in the event of an emergency at home. ■

Save the date: Cottonwood Heights' annual city shakeout Saturday, April 12

Participate in Cottonwood Heights' annual city shakeout on Saturday, April 12, from 9 a.m. to noon! This drill helps the community prepare for an emergency situation.

Put a green, yellow, red or black ribbon (or an object in that color) in a visible place outside your home before 9 a.m.:

- **Green: No medical situations**
- **Yellow: Non-life-threatening medical issue**
- **Red: Life-threatening situation**
- **Black: A death in your home**

Block captains will collect information from the street beginning at 9 a.m. The Cottonwood Heights Amateur Radio Club, a volunteer group that handles the city's radio disaster communications will then transfer the data to the emergency operations center at City Hall.

As part of the drill, residents should also create and review a personal or family emergency plan. Visit the Utah Shakeout website (shakeout.org/utah) for more tips. ■

Strengthening Sustainability, One Leg at a Time - Continued

The "Three-Legged Stool" model highlights three pillars of community sustainability. If one leg is missing, stability is lost. This month we will focus on the economic impact leg of the stool.

Recycling provides significant economic benefits. For example, recycling 10,000 tons creates 36 jobs, while landfilling the same amount creates only six. On a national scale, recycling supports 681,000 jobs and generates \$37.8 billion

in wages (EPA's REI report).

Beyond job creation, recycling conserves landfill space, delaying the need for new sites and reducing transportation and processing costs. It also lowers energy use, supports a circular economy, and creates local business opportunities.

By recycling, you're helping create jobs, reduce costs, and drive positive changes in your community. ■



Butler Elementary starting 'Bike Bus'

On October 27, 2024, local mother of two Kayla Lengyel was enjoying her weekly routine of watching 'CBS Sunday Morning' over a leisurely breakfast when a segment aired about the bike bus movement. As soon as she heard about it, she knew she wanted to start one at her daughter's school. A bike bus is like a parade mixed with a commute to school. It encourages fitness, builds community and is just plain fun. Parents feel more comfortable with their elementary-age children pedaling to school when there is safety in numbers. Justin Timberlake even joined the original bike bus in Portland, Oregon when he was recently there on tour. (Post Malone: if you're reading this, come meet some of your neighbors and ride with us!)

Serendipitously, Lengyel's daughter is in the same

class as Brad Buswell's daughter, and he is a member of the City's Parks, Trails, and Open Space Committee Active Transportation subcommittee. Together with other bike enthusiast parents, they are getting the Bobcat Bike Bus rolling. On Friday mornings after Spring Break, and until the end of the school year, students and adults will meet at Bywater Park by 8 AM to bike to school through the neighborhood. Neighbors are encouraged to join us for the flat one-mile ride zigzagging from the park to the playground.

Celebrating 20 Years of Cottonwood Heights: Pioneer Memorial Cemetery

One of Cottonwood Heights's most significant historical locations is also one of its most overlooked landmarks. Tucked away on the north side of Creek Road near 1500 East is the Union Pioneer Memorial Cemetery.

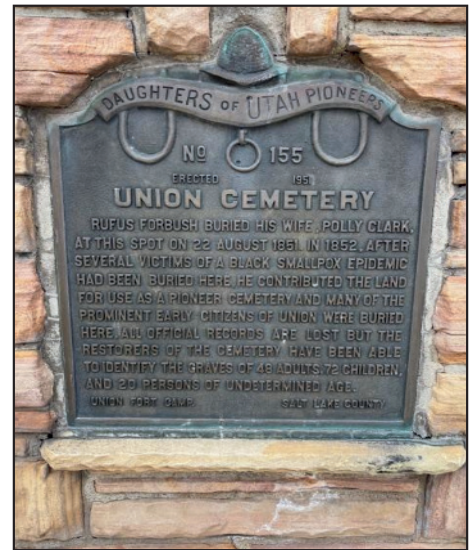
The location had a humble beginning in 1851 when settler Rufus Forbush buried his wife, Polly, in a corner of the land they were farming. An outbreak of smallpox among settlers created the need for an established cemetery to serve the outpost of Union, and Forbush donated land surrounding his wife to the cause.

A number of the settlers responsible for building Fort Union, and their descendants, were interred in the burial grounds through the years. The cemetery also has an important role in the history of the region as the final resting place of Green Flake



and his wife, Martha, who played integral roles in early Utah settlements and were part of a small but vibrant African-American community in the Union area.

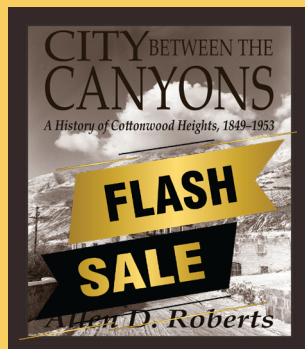
The cemetery was repaired and revitalized in 1947 to commemorate the centennial of pioneering settlement of the Salt Lake Valley. Parking is available, but visitors are asked to respect the quiet spirit of this special location. ■

Make Your Voice Heard: Join Cottonwood Heights' Community Surveys!

Do you have about one minute a month to help make Cottonwood Heights better?

The City of Cottonwood Heights is working with FlashVote to engage the community and gather valuable input from residents to inform our decisions.

We encourage residents to sign up here now: <https://www.flashvote.com/cottonwoodheights> or call 775-235-2240 to participate by phone or text only.

Sign up takes less than one minute and your input is always kept anonymous. Personal or demographic information collected by FlashVote is



never shared with the City or anyone else. When residents sign up, they can determine how surveys are received – whether by email, text or phone call. They will receive a notification whenever there is a new survey, and they will have 48 hours to participate before voting closes. Once a survey is closed, everyone who participated will automatically receive a summary of the overall results and be able to see how their responses compare to the group.

"We are excited to include our residents voices, through these surveys, to better inform decision-making at the City in ways that can help us all to build a better community," said Mayor Michael Weichers.
